

LAKE CHARLES - The Rev. Edward Foley, Cap. will be the keynote speaker at the fifth annual Liturgy Formation Day on to be held on Saturday, Jan. 13, 2007. The day will begin at 8:45 a.m. and continue until 12 noon at Our Lady Queen of Heaven Church, 3939 Lake Street. This year's program is entitled, "Lex Orandi, Lex Credendi" - "We Pray As We Believe."

Fr. Foley is Professor of Liturgue and Musicia and the

Fr. Foley is Professor of Liturgy and Music and the founding Director of the Ecumenical Doctor of Ministry Program at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. A member of the Province of St. Joseph of the Capuchin Order since 1966, he was ordained a priest in 1975. He has authored more than 300 scholarly and pastoral articles and sits on a number of editorial boards.

His unique presentations incorporate music and story-telling into sharing knowledge and understanding of liturgy in a challenging yet inviting way.

Social justice important aspect of Religious Ed

LAKE CHARLES - The year Denise Donahoe became an Assistant Director of Religious Education for the Diocese of Lake Charles, one of the key issues she began working on was social justice education. Social justice or social teaching can be described as that teaching which deals with the rights and duties of man organized into society, especially with the economic aspects of society.

Now as Director of the Office, which like every program and ministry of the Diocese relies on contributions to the annual Diocesan Services Appeal now ongoing in the parishes, Donahoe sees the need to continue to provide education about Catholic Social Teaching.

"When I came to the Diocese we put together booklets that each of the parishes and the schools would get to help them in making sure that that aspect of the Church is carried out, that quality education is carried out," Donahoe said.

She hearkened back on her experience at Immaculate Conception Cathedral School as well

"When I first started there, and I looked at their program, I could see that they were teaching the doctrine and I could see that they were having community, building community in their school, but I didn't see a lot of service outside," she said. "It was an insular place. If there was a need within the school, if perhaps someone's house burned down, they'd have a fundraiser but they didn't seem to see the bigger church, the world.

"So when the Task Force was put together and could see we needed to move in that direction, I could see that we needed help within the schools, to do that," Donahoe continued. "Something ended up being mandated. In schools if you have it on the front burner you have to have it mandated. From that has come the social justice paraliturgy in February every year as a celebration of what our students are learning and that is for fourth and fifth graders with all the Catholic schools as well as Episcopal Day School being invited."

The event is held at a different school each year and everyone takes a role, putting together a skit, a song, a poetry reading, according to Donahoe.

An exciting aspect of the Office currently is the arrival of the results of a survey done by the parishes called Information for Growth of Adults (IFG).

"We had a grant from Extension Society two years ago to do the study," Donahoe said. "We were assessing where our adults were who teach our students and where students were so we can evaluate how programs are doing and where we need to put our emphasis on training for our adults.

"We just got the results back a couple of weeks ago and that will be really a key for us to look at in our certification program for what we offer for conferences and so forth." she said. "We are also getting the information to the pastors, giving them a birds eye view of some of their adults in the parishes, as to where the needs are, perhaps for their homilies, their own adult education, sessions for retreats they my want to get, and so forth. We are very excited about that."

Although some were resistant to do the survey in the beginning, now that the results have been seen minds may have changed.

"They are pleasantly surprised with their results," Donahoe continue. "They are seeing some clear areas where they can focus on where they need to grow. I think this is a good thing. I have already had a couple of parishes ask about whether they can do it again and for other folks. We are really excited about getting this information. It is a view of where we need to focus our efforts in training and adult education all together."

Donahoe notes that in February, the Diocese will do the Assessment for Catholic Religious Education for the fifth, eighth, ninth, and eleventh grades in all the schools.

"We hope that in the years to come we will be doing both of these assessments in all parishes and schools," she said. "Many pastors are not only looking at it for those who teach the children but also for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and those involved with adult education."

In her work with the Office of Catholic schools Donahoe aided in the investigation of religious education textbooks being used in the Diocese.

"We worked on making sure we had textbooks that were doctrinally sound as well as pedagogically sound," she said. 'Each year we work on that and have gotten down to five or six publishers with the best of their series and their most current books.

"We also adopted a curriculum guide because we didn't have one of our own," Donahoe continued. "We piggybacked with the Archdiocese of Indianapolis. We are paying them for its use and then we are adapting it for our Diocese. It was piloted in 2002 and then mandated in 2003.

"As we adapted it we changed some of the paper work that was used to help us see how we are doing and had to send the changes to Indianapolis," she said. "It happened that they like how we had changed it and they have now implemented some of our changes."

Recently Donahoe held a workshop to provide teachers with information on how to enliven their classes, using multi-sensory efforts and showing them how to use adequate methods that engage all ways of learning.
