Did you know...

Immaculate Catholic Church in Maplewood was established on July 5, 1959 less than nine years after a small chapel was dedicated by The Most Reverend Jules B. Jeanmard in Nov. 1950. It was a mission of Our Lady of Prompt Succor in the beginning. From its original site it was forced to move due to the construction of Interstate 10 to its current location. The founding pastor was the Rev. Henry Lenz, M.S., then an assistant at Our Lady of Prompt Succor. Priests of the Missionaries of Our Lady of LaSalette led the parish until 1999 when the Rev. Msgr. Vincent A Sedita was named pastor, a role in which he continues.
