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National Maritime Day, blessing of fleet Sunday

LAKE CHARLES – The Apostleship of the Sea and the Seafarers Center of the Diocese of Lake Charles will celebrate National Maritime Day on Sunday, May 24, with the blessing of the fleet at the Lake Charles Civic Center Seawall, according to Deacon Patrick Lapoint, Director of the Seafarers Center.

The Rev. Richard Adiukwu, chaplain of the Center, will preside at the memorial prayer service and then bless the craft that pass the reviewing stand.

Deacon Lapoint invites the captains of all vessels, no matter the size, to attend and have their craft blessed.

National Maritime Day came into being on May 22, 1933 when President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed a joint resolution of Congress designating that day to remember the first transoceanic crossing by the steamship *The Savannah*, which happened in 1819.

In 2005, the National Day of Prayer and Remembrance for Mariners and People of the Sea was designated by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops to encourage Catholics in the United States to support and participate in prayer services and remembrance of those who work in the maritime world. The event coincides with National Maritime Day in the United States of America.

There are 47 archdioceses and dioceses around the United State with Apostleship of the Sea facilities, which coordinate care at maritime ports in 61 American seaports and waterways.

The President of the United States is authorized and requested annually to issue a

proclamation calling upon the people of the United States to observe such National Maritime Day by displaying the flag at their homes or other suitable places.

The Merchant Marine has over many years been the backbone of the distribution of goods over the seas of the world.

During World War II, some 6,000 American seafarers and more than 700 U.S. merchant ships fell to enemy action. No branch of the Armed Forces, except the Marine Corps, suffered a higher casualty rate.

Merchant mariners also played a vital role in the Korean Conflict, especially in the rescue of 14,000 Korean civilians by the *SS Meredith Victory*. During the Vietnam War, ships crewed by civilian seamen carried 95 percent of the supplies used by U.S. Armed Forces.

For generations, merchant marines and commercial sailors have assisted in the defense of the Nation. More than 5,000 merchant mariners supported Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom by serving aboard 157 ships moving essential supplies to the troops.

Since 1775, the United States Merchant Marine has served the U.S., helping America become a great maritime power. National Maritime Day pays tribute to these heroes who answered the call to serve when the Nation needed them most.

Today, merchant mariners continue to protect the U.S. homeland, including their support of American troops in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Did you know...

The buildings of Saint Charles Center are named to honor people important in the history of the Catholic Church in Southwest Louisiana. The Administration Building at Tabor Retreat House, the main retreat facility, is named for the Oustalet Family, the largest donor to the Retreat Center project. The two guesthouses are named for Father (later Monsignor) Hubert Cramers, an early 20th Century pastor of Immaculate Conception Church (now Cathedral) and Father (later Monsignor) Joseph Peeters, a late 19th Century pastor of Our Lady Help of Christians in Jennings. Brulet Hall, the main meeting room on the east side of Tabor, is named in memory of the late Dr. and Mrs. W.J. Brulet, who were generous to the project. The youth facility at the front of the property is named for Saint Katharine Drexel, who was canonized October 1, 2000 by Pope John Paul II.

Catholic Bishops watching La. Legislature very closely

Everyone who receives any state funding is fighting to make sure the piece of the budget it has been allocated by Louisiana law is not cut during the current Louisiana legislative session.

The Louisiana Conference of Catholic Bishops (LCCB) is among those closely watching the state budget bill, House Bill 1, to make sure the amount of state funding being received by Catholic schools, Catholic social service agencies and institutions, and health care providers is not reduced.

Of foremost concern, the Louisiana bishops want to make sure that scientists would be banned from mixing human and animal embryo for stem cell research.

"This is unethical," Loar stressed. "They would be creating an unnatural species. It would be a global health hazard."

Loar said he and LCCB associate director, Rob Tasman, are working for passage of any legislation that would reject any or all parts of the Freedom of Choice Act (FOCA). This proposed federal law, which President Barack Obama has said he would sign into law, would invalidate many Louisiana laws enacted to protect the life of the unborn, the well being of pregnant women and rights of health care providers.

LCCB is particularly concerned this session about a bill that would endanger the rights of certain health care workers who refuse to prescribe contraceptive medication or perform abortions because these are against their moral conscience.

On Wednesday, May 27, principals of all of the Catholic schools in the state, and those schools that are members of Citizens for Educational Choice will meet at the Governor's Mansion for lunch and to hear an address by Gov. Jindal. They will then go to the state capitol to meet with their senators and representatives.
