# Vespers Service for Saint Peter Claver to open celebration of Diocese's Thirtieth Anniversary

LAKE CHARLES – A Vespers Service (Evening Prayer) has been scheduled for Sunday, September 13 in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception to inaugurate a year of celebration recalling the anniversary of the establishment of the Diocese of Lake Charles, according to The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles.

Bishop Provost will preside over the service that begins at 6:30 p.m. and honors the Patron Saint of the Diocese, Saint

"It is highly appropriate that we focus our attention on St. Peter Claver as we begin also this Year for Priests," Bishop Provost said. "St. Peter Claver is not only the primary patron of our diocese. He, like St. John Vianney, a good and holy priest, offered his life for others. He is a splendid example of priestly zeal, concern for justice, and total sacrifice in the celebration of the sacraments."

Saint Peter Claver was chosen as the Patron Saint of the Diocese by its first Bishop, The Most Reverend Jude Speyrer. The Diocese is privileged to have a first class relic of Saint Peter Claver, which will be on display for veneration at

Saint Peter Claver was born near Barcelona in modern day Spain in 1580; he joined the Society of Jesus, commonly called the Jesuits. After being influenced by Saint Alphonsus Rodriguez, Peter decided he wanted to be a missionary to what was then known as "The New World'

To that end, he continued his studies and was sent to the then called "New Granada" or modern day Colombia and was ordained at Cartagena in 1615. Cartagena was the principal center of the African slave trade and Peter Claver spent his life trying to alleviate the horrible conditions of the slaves. He worked among the slaves in the yards where they were penned and ministered to them with food and medicine. He was able to baptize some three thousand persons in the course of his forty years of ministry. However, his ministry did not just concern the souls of these unfortunates.

Peter Claver would visit the plantations and plead with owners of these slaves to improve their conditions of life and work. During these visits, he actually lodged with the slaves. In addition to his ministry to the slaves, Peter Claver visited the imprisoned and the lepers. He was known as a great preacher and led a very austere life; he is reputed to have possessed supernatural gifts including that of prophecy, miracles and the ability to read the hearts and minds of people.

In 1650, he was stricken with a plague that beset Cartagena but he did not neglect his duties even when mortally ill. He died on September 8h and was canonized in 1888. Pope Leo XIII named him the patron of all missionary activities to African-Americans. His feast day is September 9.

Since Bishop Speyrer's choice of Peter Claver as Diocesan Patron, his feast has been observed annually. Normally, the celebration is observed on the Sunday nearest to the actual feast day thus allowing more of the faithful to attend and par-

This year's celebration is especially significant in that it will inaugurate a year-long celebration of the establishment of the Diocese of Lake Charles nearly 30 years ago. The Diocese was erected by a Decree of Pope John Paul II on January 29, 1980. Three months later, on April 25, 1980, Monsignor Jude Speyrer of the Diocese of Lafayette, was consecrated the first bishop of the newly established Diocese and served as its spiritual leader for twenty years. He was succeeded by Bishop Edward K. Braxton, then Auxiliary Bishop of Saint Louis, who was later named bishop of Belleville. In February, 2007, Pope Benedict XVI, named Monsignor Glen J. Provost of the Diocese of Lafayette as the third bishop of the Diocese of Lake Charles and he was consecrated and installed on April 22.

Various activities have been planned from September 2009 to September 2010, to commemorate and celebrate the thirtieth anniversary of the Diocese. Unique during the year will be an "Anniversary Banquet" on Saturday, April 24, 2010, at Treasures of Marilyn's in Lake Charles. New Orleans Archbishop Gregory Aymond of New Orleans will be the guest speaker. Tickets will be available in each of the parishes of the Diocese at a cost of \$100 per person and the proceeds from the event will be utilized to help fund the work of Diocesan Charities.

On Thursday, September 9, 2010, the Feast Day of Saint Peter Claver, a Mass of Thanksgiving will be celebrated at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception at 10:30 a.m. The final celebration will be on Sunday, September 12, 2010,

# Father Covert goes to Rome for Canon Law, language studies

LAKE CHARLES – Father Derek Covert, until recently the Parochial Vicar (associate pastor) of St. Margaret of Scotland Church, is now ensconced in his student quarters in Rome. Father Covert is beginning his three-year sojourn, as directed by Bishop Glen John Provost, of studies in Canon Law at the Pontifical Gregorian University with an immersion course in Italian. He left Lake Charles for the Eternal City last weekend and was scheduled to begin the language training almost immediately upon arrival.

"I will be studying Canon Law in general as well as languages," Father Covert said. "I will be required to learn three languages - Italian (all of his classes will be in Italian), Latin and also Spanish for the purposes of research.

"The Latin is part of the Canon Law curriculum but I will be on my own with the Italian and Spanish," he continued. "Much as with the Italian, I think I may try to do an immersion program in Spanish, because some of the research (in the course work) will be in Spanish. I think that would be good.'

The first semester at the Gregorian begins in October and lasts until February and the second semester starts in February and won't end until late May or early June.

The 33-year old priest was the first man ordained by Bishop Provost for the Diocese on May 26, 2007, only a few short months following Bishop Provost's consecration as the third Bishop of the Diocese.

While he was surprised that Bishop Provost asked him to pursue this course of study he was "excited because I thought there were others who could do this much better than I. The thing that continues to inspire me is what we are doing and why we are doing it."

Law in general as well as languages," Father Covert said. "I will be required to learn three languages - Italian (all of his classes will be in Italian), Latin and also Spanish for the purposes of research.

"The Latin is part of the Canon Law curriculum but I will be on my own with the Italian and Spanish," he continued. "Much as with the Italian, I think I may try to do an immersion program in Spanish, because some of the research (in the course work) will be in Spanish. I think that would be good.

The first semester at the Gregorian begins in October and lasts until February and the second semester starts in February and won't end until late May or early June.

Until the beginning of his initial semester. Father Covert will be working hard to become fluent in speaking, reading, and writing in Italian. "I will have five weeks of intensive studies in Italian and after those five weeks the same professor who is teaching the immersion program is going to tutor me for about 40 hours," Father Covert said. "Then in the third week of November I will take a proficiency examination and the goal is to pass that test."

While it seems a "sink or swim" concept, Father Covert noted that there will

be a lot of aids to help him. "There are other priests who have already been in the university and they will be of help through notes and things of that nature.'

He also pointed out that the university would be different from American universities in that "there won't be quizzes and such, daily or weekly because they deal more with a comprehensive knowledge of the subject. By the time the semester ends, which is in February the hope is that I will be proficient in Italian."

While he had some Spanish in high school and a smattering of Latin classes in the seminary, he was told by one professor that he seemed to pick up languages more easily than other stu-

"Although I am not fluent in Spanish, I think I will be able to get some of it back,' he said.

Father According to Covert, Canon Law is basically the governance of the Church. "It is used to govern the church as is civil law for our civil government," he

pects of the Church - the Sacraments, the distribution of the Sacraments, teaching in the church, and also deals with the rights and obligations of all the people, the laity as well as the clergy. The work will include studying Roman Law, philosophy, and theology of law and the law itself.'

At the end of his course of study, Father Covert will have earned a Licentiate of Canon Law or J.C.L. "It is the equivalent of a master's degree," he said.

Father Covert's return to the Diocese three years hence with his degree would probably mean working in the Tribunal. There are currently four people with the same degree working in the

"The anticipation, I believe, would have me return and take time to learn how the Tribunal works, learning from those who are there,' he said. "So I believe it is for preparation for the future, when at least some of the three priests (of the four people) would be looking toward retirement in the next 20 years or so, I would have been prepared to take someone's place, who either retired or moved on to other ministry.'

The 33-year old priest was the first man ordained by Bishop Provost for the Diocese on May 26, 2007, only a few short months following Bishop Provost's consecration as the third Bishop of the Diocese.

While he was surprised that Bishop Provost asked him to pursue this course of study he was "excited because I thought there were others who could do this much better than I.
