September 40 Hours Devotion

LAKE CHARLES – Forty Hours Devotions before the Blessed Sacrament to promote vocations to the priesthood and the religious life in the Diocese of Lake Charles continues in the Eastern Deanery of the Diocese during the remainder of September.

Beginning Wednesday, Sept. 23 after the 5:15 p.m. Mass through Friday, Sept. 25 at noon, St. Paul Church in Elton will host the Devotion.

The final two locations for September will be St. Frances Chapel in Elizabeth on Sept. 29, then continuing at Sacred Heart of Jesus Church in Oakdale until Oct. 2. Hours of Devotion are 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily.

Fargo Bishop speaks on health care reform

FARGO, North Dakota -The bishop of Fargo has outlined four principles for Catholics to take into account when analyzing the moral value of a health care reform proposal.

In a statement released Aug. 29, Bishop Samuel Aquila addressed the current debate in the U.S. legislature over various health care reform proposals.

He affirmed that the Church "ought to always promote wider and more complete access to health care," but clarified that this "does not mean that in practice the Church ought to support each and every plan which is proposed by civil leaders."

Thus, the prelate offered our principles "that should always be used when evaluating the moral value and justice of a given plan to provide health care.' The first, he stated, is that "any provisions for actions which deny the dignity of human life, especially abortion, euthanasia, whether passive or active, and embryonic stem-cell research must be excluded from all health care plans." As a second principle, the bishop affirmed, "the freedom of consciences must be safeguarded." He continued, "The moral voice of individual doctors, nurses, health professionals, as well as the general public, deserve reverence and respect." The statement emphasized a third principle: "Access to health care ought to be available to all people, including the poor, legal immigrants, the handicapped, and especially the elderly and unborn members of society.' Lastly, it continued, "the means of providing access to health care should be governed by the principle of subsidiarity, being reasonably and equitably distributed among members of society." Upon the foundation of these four principles, Bishop Aquila noted, a "fruitful discussion about health care reform" can be built. He urged Catholics to "become engaged in promoting genuine health care reform" and to work for the "well-being and flourishing of all human life."

Bishop's Services Appeal for Diocesan needs begins

LAKE CHARLES - Bishop's Services Appeal, the annual campaign to raise funds to aid in the operation of a variety of ministries and programs of the Diocese of Lake Charles will begin this weekend, Sept. 19-20, according to The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles.

The goal for this year's campaign, which has as its motto "Our Lord Is Our Model: Let Us Take Up Our Cross and Follow Him" taken from the words of St. John Vianney, remains \$600.000. the same as in 2008-2009. Last year the appeal raised \$587,695.59, nearly 98 percent of the goal, from the contributions of the Catholic faithful of the local church in Southwest Louisiana.

During this year the Diocese will celebrate its 30th anniversary of formation.

"As we prepare for this celebration, I reflect on God's generosity to us throughout these years," Bishop Provost said. "The psalmist best expresses what should be our sentiment: 'We

thank you, God, we give you thanks; we call upon your name, declare your wonderful deeds'

"I am also thankful to the people of the Diocese of Lake Charles for the generosity of 30 years to the Bishop's Services Appeal," the Bishop continued. "We show our thankfulness to God for His goodness through the sacrifices we make, giving back to Him what He has first given us. I have seen this countless times during last year's Appeal. Even with many people recovering from hurricanes Gustav and Ike, they continue to give of themselves. This is a great witness of the Catholic faithful of our Diocese to their fidelity to God, even in the midst of trial and tribulation."

Programs and ministries supported by Bishop's Services Appeal include Catholic Education (\$110,000), Youth and Young Adult Ministry (\$58,000), Vocations and Seminarians (\$71,000), Catholic Charities (\$89,000), Family Life (\$60,000), Seafarers Center (\$55,000), Diocesan Counseling (\$41,000), Evangelization (\$18,000), Communications (\$50,000), and Saint Charles Center (\$50,000). All of these areas represent identifiable support from Bishop's Services Appeal. Each of them is additionally supported through various grants and the parochial tithe.

Vocations and Seminarians is a very important ministry for the Catholic Church in Southwest Louisiana and one of the most costly, with nine men in various stages of study and training to become priests for the Diocese.

"It will cost the Diocese approximately \$275,000 to educate these men for one year of study," Bishop Provost said. "Without the help of gifts to Bishop's Services Appeal, this work is impossible.'

Bishop Provost hopes that God will grant an increase in the number of men studying to be priests. With that increase in numbers, an increase in costs will be apparent. The need to ordain more priests will become acute in the near future with the

number of current members of the Presbyterate retiring.

The Bishop has appointed a number of priests to serve as Vocation Recruiters, who will seek out men who be-



lieve they may have a calling to the priesthood. Those priests include Father Marcus Johnson, Father Ruben Buller, Father Susil Fernando, Father Anthony Fontenot, and Father Nathan Long. The Very Reverend Daniel Torres, who serves as Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia, is also the Director of Vocations and Seminarians

The Office of Evangelization has been able to expand its work of bringing the Gospel to great numbers in Southwest Louisiana. The billboard campaign last year and the office's Catholicism on the Road program were a great success. With the help of contributors to the Appeal, this work will continue to expand.

Saint Charles Center and its Tabor Retreat House and Saint Katharine Drexel Conference Center provides the opportunity for many different types of retreat programs as well conferences to aid in spiritual growth and renewal. The subsidy that the Diocese provides to the Center each year comes from contributions to the Bishop's Services Appeal. Without that aid, the Center would not be able to maintain the low costs offered. It could even be forced to reduce some of those opportunities and even raise fees.

Contributions to Bishop's Services Appeal make the programs and ministries of

the Diocese of Lake Charles operate more efficiently, enabling them to continue and even expand to reach more people in the area.

The Bishop's Services Appeal is a wonderful opportunity to continue to show support for Christ's Church, according to Bishop Provost.

"No matter the size of your gift the continuation and growth of the many programs and ministries provided are directly affected by you," Bishop Provost said. "Please continue to provide support to the "larger Church' by making a selfless gift to the 2009-2010 Bishop's Services Appeal.

'We are a people, a Church, of service - service to our community and to all those who belong in it," the Bishop continued. "Our Diocese is a legacy of people people inspired to service and sacrifice for others. Over these past 30 years, we do have much for which to be thankful. May your kindness toward the Bishop's Services Appeal ensure the future of the Church for the next 30 years."

Feast of St. Lawrence, patron of deacons held

RAYMOND -- Bishop Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, was the celebrant of the Mass for the Feast of St. Lawrence, Martyr, at St. Lawrence Church on August 10.

St. Lawrence, who died on in 258, is the Patron Saint of Deacons. The deacons of the Diocese of Lake Charles attended the annual feast day Mass.

In his homily, Bishop Provost noted the words of the day's Gospel from St. John, Chapter 12, spoke of the grain of wheat.

"This is the fundamental message of Christianity," Bishop Provost said. "Unless the grain of wheat falls to the earth and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat but if it dies it bears much fruit.

"He is speaking here of

what we call our Catholic theology - the Paschal Mystery," Bishop Provost continued. "The Paschal Mystery that is the very message of Christianity. It is the passion, death, and resurrection of the Lord. It is what we celebrate in each and every liturgical celebration that we as Catholics celebrate - the Liturgy of Hours, the celebration of one of the sacraments but particularly the celebration of the Eucharist.

The Bishop noted that on this Feast of St. Lawrence that the Saint is a number of things but one thing particularly, "He is the living out of that gospel message. In the life of St. Lawrence, in his sacrifice of himself for the Faith, we see in his martyrdom a living out of the Paschal Mystery - the Passion, Death and Resurrection. It is how we apply this in our lives that is essential.

Bishop Provost pointed out that there is no worship without sacrifice.

"Man thinks that today that he can solve his own problems," Bishop Provost continued. "This is folly. When he thinks this way then he has no sacrifice to offer. He can't enter into the Paschal Mystery because he has nothing to bring. The Paschal Mystery requires the death of which our Lord speaks in the Gospel - 'unless the grain of wheat falls to the earth and die it remains just a grain of wheat.""
