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New seminary burse funded with largest bequest ever, over \$250,000

largest donation to establish a seminary burse for the Diocese of Lake Charles has been received from the estate of Mitchell G. Duhon of Lake Charles, according to The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles. The generous bequest also pushed the total amount invested in the 51 burses to more than \$1 mil-

legacy from Mr. Duhon, a lifelong resident of Lake Charles and member of a pioneer family of the area, was made to help provide for the education of seminarians. The Mitchell Duhon Seminary Burse was funded with \$252,984.14, bringing the total value of seminary burses for the Diocese to \$1,107,695.47.

"This was a farsighted donation on the part of Mr. Duhon, in so far as it has the long-range education of seminarians in view and a desire on the part of the faithful, particularly Mr. Duhon, to see that our priests receive the best preparation, formation and education possible," Bishop Provost said.

According to family members, Mr. Duhon, a bachelor and a charter member of Our Lady Queen of Heaven Parish, was a "very private person, deeply religious. He would say his prayers each morning as he walked out to pickup his newspaper, as he had a long driveway.

"He was friends with the

for years and entertained many of them over the years in his home." Also, it was pointed out that many times "he opened the church for the first Mass of the day and that he had a strong devotion to the Way of the Cross. He never missed an opportunity to pray at the Stations of the Cross. He was guided in his decision to make this gift by his relationship with Jesus Christ."

Father Keith Pellerin, pastor of St. Martin de Porres Church, confirmed the early morning ritual. "Every Sunday morning he was here before 6:30 a.m. because he wanted to be in the church by himself to pray the Way of the Cross," Father Pellerin said. "When we were a chapel, he had his own key and opened it up himself. Perhaps it was one of the devotions that he was taught as a child."

Father Pellerin also noted his private nature. "He never wanted to call attention to himself. He didn't want accolades. One vear Mr. Duhon was chosen to receive one of the Maple Leaf awards and he didn't want to go to the ceremony. He said, 'I'm not doing this for that (the award and recognition). It's what God has called me to do and what He calls me

Mr. Duhon, who died on April 28 at the age of 85, graduated from LaGrange High School and attended

McNeese Junior College. A member of the United States Navy he was ultimately trained as a frogman and assigned to an underwater demolition team following Underwater Demolition School. He also attended Southwestern Louisiana Institute in Lafayette and the U.S. Navy Reserve School of Communications at Harvard University in Boston. He was a veteran of World War II having done occupational reconnaissance duty with his underwater demolition team in Japan.

Following his discharge, he attended Loyola University of the South School of Pharmacy in New Orleans and began his pharmaceutical career at Gordon's Drug Store in Lake Charles and

Cade's Pharmacy in Sulphur, later opening his own business, Enterprise Pharmacy at the corner of Enterprise Boulevard and Twelfth

He was a member of the Louisiana State Pharmaceutical Association, Monsignor Irving DeBlanc Knights of Columbus Council 4562, and Monsignor Cramer's Assembly 4th Degree Knights of Columbus. He was a parishioner of Our Lady Queen of Heaven Church and St. Martin de Porres Church.

A seminary burse is a permanent fund set aside to provide income for the education of seminarians. The principal of the fund is never spent but invested, with the interest used each year for education expenses of those men studying for the priesthood. Since the principal is never touched, this fund is truly a "gift that will give forever." Donations made to any seminary burse will continue to support the education of seminarians in perpetuity.

Seminary burses can be established with any amount of money and gifts may be added to current burses.





Our Lady of Prompt Succor Church celebrates 90 years

SULPHUR – Our Lady of Prompt Succor Catholic Church celebrated its 90th anniversary of establishment on Sunday, Sept. 19, with Mass and a dinner. Rev. Joseph Gosselin, M.S., the church's pastor, was the celebrant and the Very Rev. Daniel A. Torres, Vicar General of the Diocese of Lake Charles was the homilist.

Rev. Gerard Boulanger, M.S.; Rev. Ernest Corriveau, M.S.; Rev. Egidio Vecchio, M.S., (a former pastor of the church) and Father Torres were concelebrants.

The beginnings of the Catholic community in the Sulphur area go back to the early part of the 20th century with the 1907 construction of a wooden chapel on the corner of Logan and South Huntington Streets. The building was destroyed by the Hurricane of 1918 and was rebuilt. A year later, Lafayette Bishop, The Most Reverend Jules B. Jeanmard established the new parish dedicating it to the Blessed Virgin Mary under the title of Our Lady of Prompt Succor. This title had been previously approved by the Holy See as the Patroness of the City of New Orleans and the entire state of Louisiana.

The Rev. Joseph LeBerre was named the founding pastor. In 1921, Bishop Jeanmard invited the Missionaries of Our Lady of LaSalette to come into the diocese and gave the responsibility for the parish to them. The first LaSalette priests in the diocese were Rev. John Ramel, M.S., and his assistant Rev. Eugene Veillard, M.S.

A new brick church building was built on the corner of Huntington and Logan Streets and dedicated in 1924. This facility was remodeled, enlarged and renovated several times during the next 65 years.

New offices and a parish rectory were constructed adjacent to Our Lady's School on Cypress Street in the late 1970s. In 1984, a new church building was built and dedicated on the Cypress Street

site. Father Vecchio was the pastor of Our Lady of Prompt Succor during this period.

Our Lady of Guadalupe Torch Run will make way through LC Nov. 9-10

LAKE CHARLES – The annual relay, the <u>International Run Carrera Antorcha Guadalupana Mexico-New York Torch Race</u>, which connects Mexico and the United States, will make its way through the Diocese of Lake Charles on Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 9-10.

The journey began Oct. 5 at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City and will end at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City on Dec. 12, the Feast Day of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

The run, which began in 2002, represents the fervor and faith Hispanics have for our Lady of Guadalupe, arguably the premier national symbol of Mexico and its culture. The relay seeks to promote friendship and solidarity among Mexican-American community groups all along its path, and provide a symbolic link for those families divided by the international border. More than 25,000 people take part in the relay and an audience of more than 22 million in Mexico and the United States monitor its progress.

Runners, representing Mexico's migrant community, will bring the blessed fire of the Torch of Our Lady of Guadalupe across the Texas-Louisiana state line at approximately on Monday, Nov. 10. It will be met by runners from Southwest Louisiana who will join with the Mexican runners, and Rev. Arturo Lozano, S.J., Director of Hispanic Ministry for the Diocese of Lake Charles, along a route down U.S. Highway 90 through Vinton, Sulphur and Westlake.

The runners will be driven from the west side of the Calcasieu River I-10 Bridge into Lake Charles and will meet with other local runners at the Southwest Louisiana Convention and Visitor's Bureau on Lakeshore Drive before continuing the journey down Broad Street to St. Henry Catholic Church, 1021 Eighth Avenue, for a 6 p.m. Liturgy, followed by a reception in the St. Henry Community Center. Everyone is invited to come meet the torchbearers and attend the Mass and reception.

On Tuesday, Nov. 10 runners will recommence the journey from St. Henry down Broad Street to U.S. 90 through Iowa, Welsh, Roanoke and Jennings before crossing over into Acadia Parish at the Mermentau River and into the Diocese of Lafayette.

The torch run makes its way from Mexico City through Mexican states of Estado de México, Morelos, Guerrero, Oaxaca, Puebla, Tlaxcala, Hidalgo, Veracruz, and Tamaulipas crossing the border between Matamoros and Brownsville, Texas. It then travels through San Antonio, Houston and Beaumont before crossing over into Louisiana. It continues its journey through Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, Washington, DC, Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania and, finally, New York. At its conclusion it will have passed through more than 60 cities covering 3,813 miles.

Animals blessed at Holy Family School

MOSS BLUFF – St. Theodore Holy Family Catholic School recently held a "blessing of the animals" event honoring the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi,.

Reverend James A. Doyle, who is widely known for his love of animals, gave a special blessing to a large group of animals, including a miniature horse, many different breeds of dogs, several cats, a rabbit, and several hamsters, including one named Jasmine. In addition, the pre-kindergarten classes at the school brought stuffed animals from home, which Father Doyle also blessed.

St. Francis was born in 1181 or 1182 and died in 1226. He is the founder of the Orders of Friars Minor, more commonly known as the Franciscans and was a deacon. He reportedly began suffering from the Stigmata on or about September 14. 1224, the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross, following having received a vision described as "a vision of a seraph, a six-winged angel on a cross. This angel gave him the gift of the five wounds of

Francis died on the evening of October 3, 1226. Pope Gregory IX nounced him a saint on July 16, 1228 and on the following day, the pope laid the foundation stone for the Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi. He was buried on May 25, 1230 under the Lower Basilica. His burial place remained inaccessible until it was rediscovered in 1818. A crypt was constructed in a neoclassical style under the lower basilica for his remains.

This was refashioned between 1927 and 1930 into its present form and in 1978 the remains of St. Francis were identified by a commission of scholars, appointed by Pope Paul VI and put in a glass urn in the ancient stone tomb.

Considered to be the first Italian poet by literary critics, Saint Francis believed commoners should be able to pray to God in their own language, and he wrote always in the dialect of Umbria instead of Latin. His writings are considered to have great literary value.
