Boston Auxiliary Bishop homilist at 2010 Red Mass

LAKE CHARLES - The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, celebrated the 2010 Red Mass on October 15 in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. On hand were judges, attorneys and other government officials from the five civil parishes of the Diocese of Lake Charles -Calcasieu, Cameron, Allen, Beauregard and Jefferson Davis. The Most Reverend Robert Hennessey, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Boston was the homilist.

In his homily Bishop Hennessey urged anyone Catholic lawyer or judge who was not a member of the St. Thomas More Society to do so. "It is a great way to express your

Born in 1952 in South Boston, he noted that he comes from a family with a history of law enforcement careers, specifically members of the Boston Police Department, the Massachusetts State Police, the U.S. Customs Service and U.S. Marshal's Service.

"We were the typical Boston Irish Catholic family," he said. "But those professions - police and priests - have suffered ups and downs in the public esteem in the past several

"Professions like judges and lawyers do not always enjoy the highest level of esteem also," he continued. He noted that he Googled jokes about lawyers and was directed to some 96,100 different sites as well as 126,400 sites for jokes about lawyers. "I resisted going to those sites," he said.

"I also Googled "jokes about Bishops" and was duly informed that 12,600 sites were devoted to that subject. I didn't resist that temptation though, but not all of them were

He pointed out that even in the Bible; professions like judges and lawyers didn't fare well. "In twenty-third Chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus addressed the guardians of law, saying 'Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, you hypocrites. You lock the kingdom of heaven before human beings. You do not enter yourselves, nor do you allow entrance to those trying to enter. Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, you hypocrites. You traverse sea and land to make one convert, and when that happens you make him a child of Gehen-

na twice as much as yourselves. Woe to you, blind guides, who say, 'If one swears by the temple, it means nothing, but if one swears by the gold of the temple, one is obligated.'

He also noted that Jesus himself was described as a judge, such as Matthew where he will "on the last day separate us on his right and left.'

'Jesus is often revealed in his role as an advocate for our cause to the tribunal of God," Bishop Hennessey said. "In Hebrews, Jesus is the lawyer who wins every single case. In Chapter 7, Jesus is always able to save those who approach God through him."

The St. Thomas More Society, Judge Henry Yelverton Chapter, organized in 2008, is the sponsor of the Red Mass, which refers to the Liturgy celebrated for judges, prosecutors, attorneys, law school professors, students, and government officials at the opening of the judicial year. The Mass requests guidance from the Holy Spirit for all who seek justice, and offers the opportunity to reflect on what Catholics believe is the God-given power and responsibility of all in

Nine St. Louis seniors recognized in scholarship competition

LAKE CHARLES -- Nine seniors at St. Louis Catholic High School have received recognition in the 2011 National Merit Scholarship Competition (NMSC). Lauren Snider and Bruno Beltran have been named National Merit Semifinalists, Jordan Aubey has been named a Semifinalist in the National Achievement Scholarship Program, and Danielle Bercier, Manon Burns, Ellen Landry, Rachel Livingston, Maria Mendez, and Anne Monk have been named Commend-

Snider and Beltran have been identified as academically talented high school seniors who will have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 8,400 Merit Scholarship awards, worth more than \$36 million, that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, Semifinalists must advance to the Finalist level of the competition by fulfilling several requirements.

Aubey has been chosen as one of only 1,600 Black American high school seniors who will have an opportunity to continue in the competition for approximately 800 Achievement Scholarship Awards, worth \$2.5 million, to be offered next spring.

Bercier, Burns, Landry, Livingston, Mendez and Monk

have each been selected as one of 34,000 high performers named on the basis of their exceptional academic promise. Although they will not continue in the 2011 competition for National Merit Scholarships, these students placed among the top five percent of the more than 1.5 million students who took the PSAT last year.

In addition, Beltran and Mendez have also been named National Hispanic Recognition Program Scholars. They are among the nearly 5,000 students nationwide who were selected for this honor.

Core Team provides guidance to Office of Evangelization

So often we are told as Catholic Christians that by our baptism we are called to evangelize others about the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. In a September 2006 homily Pope Benedict XVI reminded people of how we can do this. He said:

"To be a witness of Jesus Christ means above all to bear witness to a certain way of living. In a world full of confusion we must again bear witness to the standards that make life truly life." (Homily at ecumenical Vespers in the Cathedral of Regensburg, September 12, 2006)

The diocesan Office of Evangelization, therefore, is not necessarily where the best evangelization will happen, but rather in the living witness of the faithful. The Office of Evangelization does have programs aimed at supporting initiation ministry in our church parishes as well as encouraging those al-

ready living the Faith.

The Evangelization Core Team (ECT) is a group of people from various corners of the diocese who meet regularly to pray about and discuss Catholic outreach has created some of these programs. During a table discussion about how important it is to affirm all Catholics that their life stories, struggles and reliance on God should be something shared in community, this group came up with Catholicism on the Road, where lay people give their testimonials during the weekend Masses followed by giving resource packets to parishioners as they exit. In much the same way that Jesus likes to use real life stories in teaching, we should be willing to share ourselves, imperfect followers of Christ's message, with our community of fellow believers.

They also offered workshops to church parish evangelization teams in an effort to encourage their activities. The billboards that displayed the annual theme of the Pope during the last three years are another product of this group. The group is fluid in attendance, depending on who feels called and who can take time out from work and family. What we have come to believe is that the Holy Spirit knows who to send according to the work at hand.

It is noteworthy that this small group of devoted, unselfish volunteers, who are all very involved with busy lives and other ministries, make a difference in our diocese. Every one of us has been given just the right gifts from God to also go and make a difference. Let us pray that more and more people will be empowered to dare to share those gifts in any way God wills.

Our Lady of Guadalupe Torch Run Nov. 10-11

LAKE CHARLES – The annual relay, the International Run Carrera Antorcha Guadalupana Mexico-New York Torch Race, which connects Mexico and the United States, will make its way through the Diocese of Lake Charles on Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 10-11.

The journey began in early October at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City and will end at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City on the Feast Day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Sunday, Dec. 12.

The run, which had its beginnings in 1998, represents the fervor and faith Hispanics have for Our Lady of Guadalupe, arguably the premier national symbol of Mexico and its culture. The relay seeks to promote friendship and solidarity among Mexican-American community groups all along its path, and provide a symbolic link for those families divided by the international border. More than 25,000 people take part in the relay and an audience of more than 22 million in Mexico and the United States monitors its progress.

Runners, representing Mexico's migrant community, will bring the blessed fire of the Torch of Our Lady of Guadalupe along with a large painting of Our Lady across the Texas-Louisiana state line at on Wednesday, Nov.

Louisiana who will join with the Mexican runners, and Rev. Arturo Lozano, S.J., Director of Hispanic Ministry for the Diocese of Lake Charles, along a route down U.S. Highway 90 through Vinton, Sulphur and Westlake.

The runners will be driven from the west side of the Calcasieu River I-10 Bridge into Lake Charles and will meet with other local runners at the Southwest Louisiana Convention and Visitor's Bureau on Lakeshore Drive before continuing the journey through downtown Lake Charles along Broad Street to Eighth Avenue and then to St. Henry Catholic Church for a 5:30 p.m. Liturgy. A reception will follow in the St. Henry Community Center. Everyone is invited to come meet the torchbearers and attend the Mass and reception.

On Thursday, Nov. 11 runners will recommence their journey from St. Henry down Broad Street to U.S. 90 through Iowa, Welsh, Roanoke and Jennings before crossing over into Acadia Parish at the Mermentau River and into the Diocese of Lafayette.

At the conclusion of the journey the torch will have gone through nine Mexican states, 13 in the United States, while passing through more than 60 cities and covering more than 3.133 miles.

"With this event we aim to show the faces of the local Catholic Church in all its different varieties," she continued. "We also want to make sure that Catholics remember that through our Baptism, we are all called to evangelize. It also defines evangelization as we Catholics see it, particularly through the mission statement of the Secretariat for the Ministry of Christian Formation – 'Spreading the Gospel message by Teaching and Living as Christ's disciples."

Saint Charles Center refreshes signage for 15th anniversary

LAKE CHARLES – Saint Charles Center, consisting of the Saint Katharine Drexel Conference Center and Tabor Retreat House, celebrates the 15th anniversary of its official dedication today, Friday, Nov. 5.

In conjunction with the celebration, new and refreshed signage can be found on the property to provide easy directions around the facility, according to Rev. Whitney Miller, director of the Center. One of the most spectacular of the new signs is the one that greets visitors after they have entered the property from Sam Houston Jones Parkway. That sign, a wrought iron post topped by a reflective green background, provides the name of the entry roadway – Msgr. Jules Daigle Drive.

Msgr. Jules Daigle, the pastor of Our Lady of Seven Dolors in Welsh for 44 years who authored the Cajun Dictionary and a Cajun language textbook, was a generous donor to the capital campaign that raised funds to help build Saint Charles Center. Bishop Jude Speyrer made the decision that Msgr. Daigle's generosity would be remembered by naming the entry road for him.

The new sign was made possible by the generosity of Our Lady of Seven Dolors, its parishioners and its current pastor, Rev. Archimandrite Herbert J. May.

Other signs include a welcome to Saint Charles Center sign that also includes a directional sign to Tabor Retreat House across the causeway.

In order to help pay for the new signage Father Miller,

who was named to replace Rev. Don Piraro as director on July 1, has instituted a "Sign Up Appeal". Contributions are being requested to help maintain the long term investment in Saint Charles Center, which will "reap blessings and benefits for years to come,." Father Miller said.

Saint Charles Center was dedicated on Sunday, Nov. 5, 1995 by the Apostolic Nuncio to the United States, Archbishop (later Cardinal) Agostino Cacciavillan. Bishop Speyrer had made his home on the grounds of the center until his retirement in 2000.

The Center was a project 10 years in the planning and de-

The Center was a project 10 years in the planning and development and consists of nine buildings and in recent years New Bethany Cemetery, where a number of clergy have already been interred.

Did you know...

Hurricanes Rita in 2005 and Ike in 2008 forced rebuilding and/or refurbishment of all the Catholic churches in Cameron Parish - Sacred Heart of Jesus in Creole, St. Mary of the Lake in Big Lake, Our Lady Star of the Sea in Cameron, St. Eugene in Grand Chenier, and St. Peter the Apostle in Hackberry. Work continues on many of the other structures - rectories, religious education classrooms and the like - damaged or destroyed by Rita and Ike. Storms in the earlier part of the 20th Century and Hurricane Audrey in 1957 also destroyed churches and chapels on the coast. Since 1980, two parish churches and one chapel have been destroyed by fire -Immaculate Conception in Sulphur (destroyed 1981, rebuilt 1984), St. Paul in Elton (destroyed 1982, rebuilt 1984) and St. John the Baptist Chapel in Lacassine (destroyed 2003, rebuilt 2005). The fire at St. Paul was the second time the church had burned, the first in 1929.
