Celebration of Diocesan 30th anniversary begins

(For more on this story go to lcdiocese.org) LAKE CHARLES - Thirty years ago, on April 25, 1980, Bishop Jude Speyrer was ordained a Bishop and installed as the first

Bishop of Lake Charles.

It had been on January 29, 1980 that Pope John Paul II decreed the establishment of the Diocese of Lake Charles, breaking off the five westernmost civil parishes of the Diocese of Lafayette to create the new diocese. The then-Msgr. Jude Speyrer had been the Chancellor and Vicar General of the Diocese of Lafayette when he was tabbed as the Founding Bishop of Lake Charles. The Lake Charles Civic Center was the site of the grand celebration on that last Friday in April and the thousands who attended or who watched live on television will remember the great joy they experienced in seeing the beginning of a new era for the local church of Southwest Louisiana.

Over these last 30 years, the clergy and laity of the diocese have seen God's grace working in many marvelous and wonderful

The observance of the milestone began Saturday, April 24, with Bishop Glen John Provost hosting an Anniversary Banquet, featuring The Most Reverend Gregory Aymond, Archbishop of New Orleans, as the keynote speaker. Bishop Speyrer, now Bishop-emeritus, was in attendance as was Washington, D.C Auxiliary Bishop-emeritus Leonard Olivier, a native son of Sacred Heart of Jesus Church in Lake Charles; Bishop Michael Jarrell of Lafayette; and Bishop Curtis Guillory, a Louisiana native and Bishop of Beaumont, Texas. More than 300 people attended the banquet. Funds raised from the event are benefitting Catholic Charities of the Diocese

of Lake Charles. Serving as waiters and waitresses for the event were the members of the Diocesan Youth Ministry Core Team.

Archbishop Aymond, who served as Rector of Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans prior to his elevation to the Episcopacy as Bishop of Austin, Texas, was named Archbishop of New Orleans on June 12, 2009.

In his remarks, the Archbishop noted that, "one of the greatest compliments that you can give to another person is to say 'at a very young age you have accomplished a great deal and you have done so with integrity'. May I suggest that that high compliment is one that goes to you as the people of God of the Diocese of Lake Charles. You are only 30 years old. We still call that in our world today, young and, perhaps, young adult. But also, when you look at the history of our Church, when you look back over 2,000 years, you are indeed a very, very young Diocese. Yet, you have accomplished so much as the People of God here in Lake Charles for this local Church.'

Archbishop Aymond then listed numerous programs and missions of the Diocese of Lake Charles that "you have embraced, that the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ is very active and alive here.

"I bring this litany of accomplishments to you, in order that you and I together can certainly give thanks to God because all that we do and accomplish is because of the gifts that God has given to us and because of the energy and the influence that the Spirit of God gives us to accomplish them," the Archbishop said "I also give you that list as a way to say thank you for making this Local Church so alive and so faith-filled and so faithful to mission and ministry of Christ.'

Bishops address variety of issues in current legislative session

Hearing "There is no money" over and over again at the State Legislature, Danny Loar, Louisiana Conference of Catholic Bishops (LCCB) executive director, carefully chooses the legislative matters he will lobby for or against during this current legislative

The shortage of money for state programs has caused a lot of tension in the capital, said Loar as he talked about the bills the LCCB is following. "So many groups are being hurt: health care, the handicapped, the elderly. These are tough times."

Loar and Rob Tasman, LCCB associate director, have been meeting in the archdiocese and each of the six Louisiana dioceses with the archbishop, bishops and the legislators that represent those areas to discuss the legislation that is of interest to the LCCB.

• The Foster Grandparent Program provides a stipend of \$2.65 per hour to low-income persons 55 and over, who assist children with their schoolwork. This program is funded by the federal government, with states expected to provide an "Action Match" which traditionally is 10 percent of the

 The scholarship program in New Orleans, which has been in effect since 2008, is not being cut, Loar reassured. The governor's office has placed \$8 million in the 2010-2011 budget for this program, which in 2011 will have students in grades kindergarten through fifth grade.

· Immigration is an issue the federal gov-

The Catholic Church believes all immigrants have inherent dignity and worth as human beings, regardless of their immigration status, said Loar.

 Current law requires that the physician intending to perform an abortion shall, at least 24 hours before the abortion, perform an ultrasound examination of the unborn child. LCCB is supporting a bill that would require the physician to display the ultrasound images so the woman may choose to view or not view the images of the unborn

· The Catholic Church believes that restorative justice be pursued when considering criminal law. Restorative justice involves the return to right order affected through the acceptance of responsibility, the assignment of appropriate punishment and the return or restoration of as many as possible to the human community. This is why the LCCB is supporting legislation that provides for juveniles younger than 15, who are found guilty of serious crimes, be given the possi-

Catholic schools in Louisiana educate 17 percent of all students in kindergarten through 12th grade, the highest percentage in the United States. But they receive only 57 percent (\$14.3 million) of what it costs (\$24.9 million) to collect information in 15 categories required by the State Department of Education.

bility of parole.

These schools are requesting what they are legally entitled to receive, noted Loar.

The population of Louisiana is 31 percent Catholic, but Loar remarked that 51 percent

Diocese keeps half of gifts to Communications appeal

LAKE CHARLES - Bringing the Good News of the Diocese of Lake Charles to everyone is an important and expensive proposition. Last year the budget for those communication efforts was more than \$350,000.

Those funds came from a variety of sources, individual contributions, a portion of gifts to the Bishop's Services Appeal, and sponsorships for the Catholic Calendar. In addition, the Catholic Communication Campaign collection, this year scheduled for April 15-16, provided \$11,663.01 or slightly more than three percent of the budget. LAKE CHARLES - Now 102 years old, Sacred Heart Saint Katharine Drexel Catholic School has been honored by the Louisiana Trust for Historic Preservation with a 2010 Preservation Honor Award.

At the organization's recent annual conference in Shreveport, the school. which was founded in 1908 the first private, parochial school for African-Americans in the city - was presented with the award by organization secretary, A.C. Bourdier of Lake Charles. The presentation was made to Herman Metoyer, a former principal of the school as well as an alumnus, who accepted on behalf of the school. Bourdier, who diligently with worked Metoyer to nominate the landmark, noted that the school is now automatically included on the list of Calcasieu Historic Preservation Awards to be given in Janu-

Local African-American businessmen saw the great

their children and eventually hired Miss Eleanor Figaro, who, along with Miss Mary Ryan, began teaching in a building located at the corner of Enterprise Boulevard and Mill Street with 18 students.

In 1910, a new structure was built at the corner of Louisiana Avenue and Pine Street, which would be nicknamed the "little red schoolhouse".

It was in May 1922 that the relationship between Sacred Heart and St. Katharine Drexel began as Father Hackett secured the services of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. The daughter of Francis Drexel, the scion of a wealthy Philadelphia family, she used her inheritance to finance her religious order and build schools for Native Americans and African Americans across the Untied States.

Saint Katharine Drexel who made several personal visits to the school, was canonized by Pope John Paul II on October 1, 2000.
