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For the conclusion of the Year for Priests, the priests of the Diocese of Lake Charles joined Bishop Glen John Provost during the first week of June for the Convocation of Priests held at Saint Charles Center in Moss Bluff. Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, honored 61 couples marking marriage milestones during 2010 at a Liturgy on Sunday, June 13, in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. The Diocese's Office of Family Life sponsors the annual event.

Bishop Provost, before beginning his homily, blessed the married couples.

In his homily the Bishop spoke of the witness the couples have made to the beauty of married life.

"Married life is important to us for a number of reasons," Bishop Provost said. "It is first and foremost the very basis of our civilization, the faithful marriage of man and woman. Furthermore, for the Christian, marriage is a symbol of the union of Christ with His Church. No less a teacher than St. Paul reminds us of this.

"For no one hates his own flesh,' writes St. Paul, speaking of husbands and wives, but rather nourishes and cherishes it, even as Christ does the church, because we are members of his body'. The love of husband and wife is a testimony to the love of Christ for His Church. We thank you for that wit-

The Bishop noted that over the years of married life each couple will have had to grant forgiveness to one another.

"When a husband and wife have those arguments and disagreements that are inevitable, then there can be

"And, the offending party cannot apologize and ask forgiveness until he or she has admitted fault. All of this requires humility, a joyful humility, admitting that we are part of a human family that is flawed and in need of God's grace.'

Oil spill is lesson in humility says the Vatican

head of the Vatican Press Office, Rev. Federico Lombardi, S.J., has said the continuing catastrophic oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico must be a lesson in humility for all human activities, not only for the energy industry

Father Lombardi, speakof Octava Dies the weekly program produced by Vatican Television, said, "It is difficult to calculate the dimensions of the disaster, but they are certainly enormous and continue to grow."

The results of the April 20 blowout on the Deepwater Horizon oil drilling platform continue to daily affect the lives of people along the Gulf Coast as well as the families of those killed and injured by the initial explosion and

"There come to mind other grave environmental disasters connected with human activity, like those of the chemical factory in Bhopal, India in 1984, or that of the nuclear reactor in Chernobyl in Ukraine in 1986, which caused a numharm to people," Father Lombardi said..

'What is striking in this case is the sense of impotence and slowness in finding a solution in the face of the disaster, on the part of one the largest and most well-equipped multinational ing on the a recent episode oil companies in the world, but also on the part of the most powerful country on

> The oil well's owner, BP, has been deemed the main culprit for what has become the largest spill in U.S. history, though the multinational corporation objects to this accusation.

The U.S. government has declared a fisheries disaster for the states of Louisiana, Alabama and Mississippi. It is estimated that the fishing industry will lose some \$2.5 billion due to the spill.

"This is something incredible, but it is a fact," Father Lombardi said. "It is not the eruption of a volcano but of a relatively small hole made by man on the ocean floor. And yet, in two months, super-specialized scientists

VATICAN CITY - The ber of deaths and serious and technicians have not been able to stop it. Will we be able to learn a lesson from this about prudence and care in using the resources of the earth and about the planet's equilibri-

ums? "Certainly, much will change from now on in the oil drilling industry to make it safer," Father Lombardi continued. "But perhaps we can also learn a lesson of humility. Technology will always make progress, but if in relatively simple production processes such impotence is manifested, what will we do if much more complex processes get out of control, like those that have to do with the energy hidden in the nucleus of material or still more in the processes of the formation of life."

In conclusion Father Lombardi noted, "Benedict XVI was quite right to end his last encyclical on the big problems of humanity today with a chapter on responsibility in the use of power and technology."

Nicaraguan charity aided by local golfers, missionaries

LAKE CHARLES - She calls herself a builder and a visionary, but Charlotte Somarriba is much more than that. She's a teacher, even though she doesn't do it in the classroom. She teaches by her example of hard work, which is why many children in Managua, Nicaragua are being regularly fed and educated at the three centers she oversees in that Central American city.

Mrs. Somarriba was in Lake Charles recently to thank some of the people who have helped her with their financial contributions as well as their own work. The Johnnie Thibodeaux Jr. Memorial Golf Tournament, held each year at Mallard Cove Golf Course, was organized by Johnnie and Susan Thibodeaux in memory of their son, who died in a 2005 automobile crash. Funds from the event go to the San Cristobal Boys Home in Managua as well as the Asociacion Pan Y Amor or the Association of Bread and Love in Managua. This year's event made \$15,000 and had 118 golfers participating.

The Association was created by a group of volunteers - spearheaded by Mrs. Somarriba who saw the necessity for an organization which would assist the poorest and most vulnerable sectors of Nicaragua's already impoverished society, by offering adequate solutions to meet these peoples' most basic needs. Their mission is, "to offer Nicaraguan children and adolescents living in high risk areas an excellent education, nutrition and health care, teach life skills and offer technical training, thus enabling them to grow to their full potential and lead productive, use-

Father Daniel Torres, who leads the Abrazando Cristo Mission Program in the Diocese of Lake Charles, has also been of great help to Mrs. Somarriba. For a number of years now Father Torres has brought volunteers each summer to Nicaragua to work among the poorest of the poor.

She was born in Nicaragua, was forced to leave the country in 1979 because of the revolution there, came to the United States (where she and her daughters became U.S citizens) and returned with her husband in

She started volunteering with Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity upon her

"I began with one day, then two days," she said. "You couldn't volunteer for all five days because they keep one day for their spirituality but I worked four.'

Then in 2000, she and others embarked on opening a feeding center in the Mercado Oriental neighborhood, one of the poorest and most dangerous in the city.

"We started with 40 children," she said. "They would come in at 7 o'clock in the morning, get a light breakfast and have three hours of basic tutoring - reading, writing and basic mathematics. Then a hot lunch and we would send them out to the local schools.

In two years the number of children had grown to 90 and the group so loved the center they didn't want it to close on weekends.

"So, we became a school," she continued. "We registered (with the government) and in 2002 started with 200 children, including a daycare center. We had three levels of preschool and all of primary school - first through sixth grade.

The school started with a half day and then went to nine full hours with the children coming in at seven and receiving a hot breakfast. 'We would provide them with a formal ed-

ucation in the morning and after lunch have extracurricular activities - art, dancing, computer classes, English tutoring, and sports. They would leave at five o'clock.

This year her group assumed management of another school operation – a big one.

"It came to us from an Austrian organization that was taking care of children in a protective environment," she said. "It was built 10 years ago along with another school in the north of Nicaragua. They offered it to us. It is a beautiful building, something we had planned to do some time in the future, but they offered to us on a silver plate."
