Patron's Feast Day Sept. 12; honors to be accorded

LAKE CHARLES – On Sunday, Sept. 12, a Vesper (Evening Prayer) Service in honor of Saint Peter Claver, Patron of the Diocese of Charles, will be held in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception beginning at 5:30 p.m. Bishop Glen John Provost will be the Principal Celebrant of this annual event, which this year concludes the year-long observance of the 30th Anniversary of the Diocese of Lake Charles.

The territory that is today known as the Diocese of Lake Charles consists of five civil parishes, which were formerly known as "Imperial Calcasieu Parish" and was established by Pope John Paul II on January 29, 1980. Monsignor Jude Speyrer, until then the Vicar General of the Diocese of Lafayette, was named the founding bishop of the Diocese. He was consecrated and installed on April 25.

Bishop Speyrer continued to shepherd the Diocese for some 20 years and during his administration the infrastructure of the Diocese was created. Saint Charles Center was built during Bishop Speyrer's administration and was the accomplishment of a long cherished dream on his part.

Bishop Speyrer was succeeded by Bishop Edward K. Braxton, then auxiliary bishop of St. Louis, Missouri, who was installed on February 22, 2001. Prior to Bishop Braxton's reassignment to the Diocese of Belleville, Illinois, in March 2005, he established two new parishes.

On March 6, 2007, Pope Benedict XVI named then Monsignor Glen John Provost as the third bishop of the Diocese

of Lake Charles, and on April 23, he was consecrated and installed at ceremonies in the Cathedral of the Immaculate

Bishop Provost requested that a "Year of Celebration Commemorating the Establishment of the Diocese of Lake Charles" be observed from September 2009 through September 2010. During this year, all Diocesan activities and celebrations have, in some way, incorporated the establishment of the Diocese. On April 24, a "Gala Banquet" was held at Treasures of Marilyn's in Lake Charles and Archbishop Gregory Aymond of New Orleans was the principal speaker. Proceeds from this banquet were given to the Diocesan Office of Catholic Charities.

The Vesper Service will be an occasion to offer thanks to God for the good work that has been accomplished by all members of the Diocese of Lake Charles during these 30 years and to ask the Lord's continued blessings upon the Diocese and ministry which it offers for years to come.

During the celebration some 90 people will be honored with Diocesan and Papal Awards in recognition of services rendered to the Diocese and the Universal Church. Members of the Diocese who have previously received such recognition are invited to attend the ceremony. Bishop Provost extends an invitation to all in the Diocese to share in this time of prayer and gratitude. A reception will follow immediately after the Vesper Service in the Cathedral's Ave Maria Hall.

Day of Recollection concludes Year for Priests; honors St. John Vianney

BELL CITY - Bishop Glen John Provost and the priests of the Diocese of Lake Charles celebrated the completion of the Year for Southwest Louisiana and the Diocese's 30th anniversary with a Day of Recollection on the Feast of St. John Vianney, August 4, here in the parish church named for him. The saint, the Curé of Ars,

had been declared the Universal Patron of Priests by Pope Benedict XVI in June 2009 when the Holy Father initiated the Year

The Rev. Whitney Miller, Secretary for the Ministry of Christian Formation for the Diocese, was the director for the large number of priests attending the day, which concluded with the celebration of Mass and a luncheon.

Father Miller gave two talks on St. John Vianney, the first on some of the lesser known aspects of the saint's life and the second on three elements of John Vianney's spirituality as a priest that could inspire and encourage modern day priests.

"He was quite a fire and brimstone preacher," Father Miller said. "Eighty-five of his sermons have survived and can be read, but he also blended in his ready availability and consistent con-

"St. John Vianney saw as the goal of his preaching that he was entrusted to lead this flock of Ars to the gates of heaven and it was not a gentle ride," Father Miller continued. "In almost every sermon his preaching returns to one of three themes - death,

judgment and hell.'

In the end, though St. John Vianney's best sermon was his life, Father Miller

"He lived in total and full dedication to the people of God he served. Through his devotion to duty as a parish which included preparing sermons as best he could for his parishioners."

Continuing Father Miller noted that "as builder and pastoral planner/steward, in addition to being a deeply

prayerful man, he also had the vision and plan for many parish buildings, additions, renovations and programs of improvement."

Father Miller also pointed out "the anawim aspect" of St. John Vianney's life.

"Like the 'little ones' of sacred scripture St. John Vianney would have identified with these rejected ones because he too experienced this in his life, as a poor student and later as a deserter from the military. He became a priest for all people,

the saint and the sinner, the great and the small, the wealthy and the poor, the fallen and the faithful. He was a man totally and fully for others, for all."

In Father Miller's second talk he spoke of how St. John Vianney's spirituality speaks to the contemporary spirituality today of priest in prayer, love and union with

God. (EDITOR'S NOTE: 'Anawim' is a Hebrew term meaning poor, humble or afflict-

Cardinal DiNardo Presents People of Life' Awards

WASHINGTON — Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, archbishop of Galveston-Houston and chair of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Pro-Life Activities, presented the People of Life award to three individuals for their lifetime commitment to the pro-life movement at a ceremony in Houston August 9. Those honored were Professor William E. May, Msgr. Philip J. Reilly and Patricia Bainbridge. Over 85 diocesan pro-life directors from across the country attended the private awards dinner during the Secretariat of Pro-Life Activities' annual Diocesan Pro-Life Leadership Conference.

The People of Life Award recognizes those who have answered the call outlined by Pope John Paul II in The Gospel of Life (Evangelium Vitae, 1995) by dedicating themselves to pro-life activities and promoting respect for the dignity of the human person. It is bestowed on occasion to a practicing Catholic in honor of his or her significant contribution in service to the culture of life.

William E. May holds a Ph.D. in philosophy from Marquette University and has taught at several Catholic universities. He is currently a senior fellow at the Culture of Life Foundation, and emeritus Michael J. McGivney Professor of Moral Theology at the Pontifical Institute for Studies on Marriage and the Family at the Catholic University of America. He has written over 226 journal articles, and has authored, co-authored, or edited 24 books.

Msgr. Philip J. Reilly has devoted most of his 50-year-long priestly ministry to the pro-life cause. He fought the legalization of abortion in New York before the 1973 Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision, helped to organize the first national March for Life in Washington in 1974, and served as a witness to uphold the Hyde Amendment banning federal funding of abortion in most circumstances. In 1989, Monsignor Reilly founded the Helpers of God's Precious Infants, Inc., to focus on prayer efforts and sidewalk counseling outside of

Patricia Bainbridge has served the pro-life movement since 1978. She recently retired from her ten-year post as director of the Respect Life Office and Natural Family Planning Coordinator for the Diocese of Rockford, Illinois, where she was also the "Lifelines" columnist for the diocesan paper. For seven years during her service, Bainbridge chaired the Department of Life for the Catholic Conference of Illinois. Prior to her diocesan work, Bainbridge founded the Christian Action Council of Western New York in the eighties, co-founded Life Decisions International, and served on the board of Christian Tapes for the Blind and Disabled, among other civic groups. She is a board member of several pro-life organizations serving the diverse needs of pregnant and post-abortive women, and raising awareness about the dignity of human life; and is chairman of the board of Human Life International.

Messages children hear in Safe Environment programs

WASHINGTON - As schools launch a new academic year, millions of children also are set to learn the ABC's of child protection. In Catholic schools and parishes nationwide, safe environment training gives children the skills necessary to protect themselves from would beoffenders. Mary Jane Doerr, associate director of the Secretariat for Child and Youth Protection of the United Conference States of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), has listed here some of the messages children hear in safe environment programs.

Abuse is never a child's fault, a point that children need to hear over and over again. Offenders try hard to make children feel complicit in the abuse or to blame them for the abuse. Children learn that that is never true! The blame always belongs to the adult who is taking advantage of a child's trust and vulnerabilities.

God loves children forever and wants them to live holy and happy lives. If a child has been abused, that child learns they are still innocent and loved by God and their families. The shame of child sexual abuse needs to be put where it belongs: on the abuser. Abuse that has happened

should be reported. Children learn to tell a parent or another trusted adult if someone is hurting them and to keep telling until they are believed. One study shows that children tell of their the vocabulary to tell others abuse an average of nine times before someone believes them. Parents can help children learn whom they can trust by pointing out the adults who can be trusted. Parents can also teach children the correct names of private body parts. This simple step gives children

what happened to them.

You can recognize abuse when it happens. Children learn to trust that feeling that says something isn't right and to tell a parent or other trusted adult when something happens that makes them feel uneasy. Children learn to question if

someone is telling them to do what the child doesn't like but says it is because he loves the child.
