Starkovich, Huckaby to be ordained Transitional Deacons

LAKE CHARLES - Jeff Starkovich and John Huckaby, both seminarians studying for the priesthood for the Diocese of Lake Charles, will be ordained to the Transitional Diaconate on Thursday, September 9, beginning at 6 p.m. during a Liturgy celebrated by The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles.

Starkovich, currently studying Theology at the North American College in Rome, is a Lake Charles native and a parishioner of Christ the King Church while Huckaby, a native of Eunice, is a Theology student at Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans.

Diaconate internships have found Huckaby stationed at St. Henry Catholic Church in Lake Charles with Father Daniel Torres and Starkovich working under the watchful eye of Father Charles McMillin at Our Lady Help of Christians Catholic Church in Jennings. Huckaby also participated in the week-long Abrazando Cristo Mission Trip to Nicaragua and both men assisted with the Christian Leadership Institute sponsored by the Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry held in June. Starkovich will return to Rome the day following his ordination to the diaconate while Huckaby will remain at St. Henry until October 17, when he returns to Notre Dame for his final year of studies.

Huckaby was admitted to "Candidacy for the Diaconate and Priesthood" in March of this year in the Chapel at Notre Dame Seminary. The Most Rev. Robert J. Baker of the Diocese of Birmingham, Ala., celebrated the Liturgy.

Admission to Candidacy is a public acknowledgement on the part of the seminarian of his intent to proceed toward Holy Orders and to continue to prepare diligently in the final period of preparation. Starkovich was admitted to "Candidacy" during the summer of 2007 prior to his departure for the North American College.

Starkovich will complete a Masters Degree in Theology from the University of St. Thomas Aquinas and return to the Diocese in June 2011.

"My first reaction is excitement," Starkovich said. "It is such a humbling experience. God calls so many people to serve in his Church, but he has called me to ordained ministry. He designed me in such a way that he could ask me to serve him in his Church, to open my life to what God wants

"Everyone has been so supportive in every step of the way," he continued. "This is the beginning of the fulfillment of the vocation process."

For Huckaby, "it is with a true sense of awe" that he comes to this point in the vocation journey.

"I have a deep gratitude to God and the Church, particularly the Church of Lake Charles for bringing me to the beginning of the fulfillment of that vocation and especially to Bishop Provost," Huckaby said.

Huckaby's internship at St. Henry has been a wonderful

experience.

There is so much to learn and I have the benefit of doing my internship in a teaching parish, one that does it so well," he continued. "I am fortunate to have priest and deacon leaders and lay leader mentors.

"I am having the opportunity to experience every type of ministry that a diocesan priest might face," Huckaby said. "I see it all first hand. This time of internship guides me to what it means to be a diocesan priest.'

Twenty-six parishes achieve Bishop's Services Appeal goals

LAKE CHARLES - Twenty-six of the 38 parishes of the Diocese of Lake Charles either met or exceeded their goals for the 2009-2010 Bishop's Services Appeal campaign just completed, according to reports from the Fiscal Office of the Diocese.

A total of \$587,097.23 or 97.9 percent, of the \$600,000 goal was raised through the generosity of the Catholic faithful of the Diocese during the annual campaign that provides funding for numerous programs and ministries of the Diocese, including Catholic Education, Youth and Young Adult Ministry, Vocations/Seminarians, Catholic Charities, Family Seafarers' Center. Diocesan Counseling, Evangelization, Communications and Saint Charles Center.

Deacons celebrate Patronal Feast

RAYMOND - The annual celebration of the Feast of St. Lawrence, the Patron Saint of Deacons, was held August 10 at St. Lawrence Church with The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, as celebrant.

St. Lawrence, martyred in the year 258 during the reign of the Roman Emperor Valerian, was one of seven deacons who were in charge of giving help to the poor and the needy.

In his homily, Bishop Provost spoke of the grain of wheat, mentioned in the readings of the day. "We heard the important words in the Gospel that 'if a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies it will produce much fruit.' Whoever loves his life will lose it and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life. The Lord said, whoever serves me must follow Me and where I am there also will my servant be. The Father will honor whoever serves Me.

The Bishop also spoke of the importance of the spiritual life.

"We strive to take the spiritual life seriously, but we never take it seriously enough," Bishop Provost said. "For those of us in Orders (deacons, priests, bishops) it begins I think, not only with the Eucharist which is the very heart and center of our prayer, but with the Liturgy of the Hours – morning prayer, evening prayer, sanctifying the day, mid-day prayer, night prayer. Through the Office of Readings we let the Scriptures nourish us.

"If indeed we are serious

about prayer then spend time before the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament everyday without fail," he continued. "As St. John Vianney said, 'listening to God in


his presence."

Since the 18th Century the Vatican has recognized outstanding service and contributions to the Church on the part of Catholic lay people and over the years it has developed orders of Knighthood and decorations for the

The Order of St. Gregory the Great was instituted by Pope Gregory XVI in 1831 as a reward for subjects of the Papal States. In 1905 it was reorganized by Pope Pius X as a worldwide Order, available to those laymen who have contributed in an outstanding way to the welfare of Church and Community and who have displayed indisputable zeal in service to the Holy See.

The Order Sylvester was instituted in 1841 by Pope Gregory XVI as a recognition for those who have been of outstanding service to the church in the Papal States. It 1905 it was re-organized by Pope Pius X as a worldwide recognition for services to the Church.

The Papal Cross "Pro Ec-

Church and the Pope) is a decoration authorized by the Holy See for men and women who have contributed noteworthy services to the Church. In the Diocese of Lake Charles, the Cross is presented for services and contributions to the Church at the Diocesan level over a period of 10 years or more.

The Papal Medal "Benemerenti" (Well Merited) is a decoration authorized by the Holy See for men and women who have tributed outstanding vices to the Church. In the Diocese of Lake Charles the medal is presented for services and contributions at the deanery level over a period of 10 years or more.

Diocesan awards, which can be given to members of the Local Church include the Order of Saint Charles and the Devoted Service Medal.

The Most Reverend Jude Speyrer, the founding Bishop of Lake Charles, and now Bishop Emeritus, established a personal award for recognition which may be presented to members of the clergy and laity of the dioto the Church and the Bish-

This award is the Order of St. Charles, a decoration named in honor of the patron saint of the City of Lake Charles, and which was established in three classes -Companions, Officers and Members.

The Companion class is limited to 12 living recipients. Four Officers may be invested each year. There is no limit placed upon the number of Members.

The award was created to afford the Bishop an opportunity to express his personal thanks to those who have contributed in a special way to the welfare and development of the Church and the Diocese.

The second decoration established by the Diocese of Lake Charles is the Devoted Service Medal, which is presented to men and women for outstanding services at the church parish level. These awards are made upon recommendation of the pastors of the parishes of the

Bishop Provost announces new translation for the Roman Missal

LAKE CHARLES -- Official word has been received by the Diocese of Lake Charles that the Holy See has approved the English translation of the Roman Missal, third edition. The effective date for use is the First Sunday of Advent, 2011 (November 27, 2011), according to a statement by The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles.

Bishop Provost in his statement announced the following: "It is a great pleasure to have received word that the official text of the new translation of the Roman Missal is approved. There is much to recommend this text that has been the subject of so much discussion and hard work by

expert translators for many years.

Two of its strongest points, in my opinion, are its fidelity to the original text and its awareness of references from Sacred Scripture, which have always permeated Catholic liturgy. The priests of the diocese will receive a timetable for catechesis on the new Roman Missal at this year's Fall Deanery meetings. The priests of the diocese are also invited to a workshop in Alexandria in October on this topic. The pastors of the diocese will be invited to lead their parishioners to a deeper understanding of the liturgical celebration for which this new translation is a

Lake Charles is an expensive task. The 10 men currently in various stages of their discernment, education, and training are attending five different seminaries.

This year the cost of tuition and fees for these men will be more than \$250,000. Bishop Glen John Provost's appointment of vocation recruiters as well as a director of Vocations and Seminarians shows his strong determination to seek out others whom the Holy Spirit is calling to the vocation of diocesan priest.

The Diocese provides 55 percent of a seminarian's educational cost at the college/philosophy level with the student responsible for the remainder, which may be paid through grants and loans. At the theological seminary the Diocese obligates itself to pay 100 percent of the educational costs.

At the opposite end of priestly life is the retired priest. We must see to the care and welfare of these men who have given their lives to spreading the Gospel message in the faith commu-Southwest nities Louisiana. Currently men, nine priests and our Bishop-emeritus, are in this

The Diocese will expend nearly \$300,000 on the welfare of these wonderful and holy men during the next fiscal year. The depth of their sacrifice to the Faith is reason enough to aid them for the remainder of their days.
