In comparing scores from standardized tests, students from the Diocesan schools scored substantially higher than the national average at every grade level. Statistics also show that Catholic school students are less likely to drop out and are more likely to go on to college. Catholic schools provide smaller classrooms and more personal attention to every student. With a smaller teacher-to-student ratio, teachers are able to gain insights that enhance the whole learning process for students. Realizing that each child is unique with different learning styles, teachers are able to utilize individualized plans for classroom teaching. LAKE CHARLES -- The Catholic Diocese of Lake Charles is a place that expresses God's inclusiveness and love. One of the ways



this is made known is through its desire to encourage and support the establishment of a Faith and Light Community.

Faith and Light helps people with intellectual disabilities and their families find their place within the Church and society. Rev. Brian King and Cathy King with the support of Denise Donahoe, Director of the Diocesan Office of Religious Education and countless parents and friends of those with intellectual disability meet on the second Saturday of each month at Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic School from 10 to 11:30 a.m.

Each monthly Gathering is grounded in a scriptural theme where those individuals with a disability, their parents and their friends can grow together in God's love and acceptance. On a regular basis, a Eucharistic Celebration is offered.

"This is a ministry that invites persons of all denominations to participate so there is a need to keep Gatherings as inclusive as possible," Father King said. "At each Gathering there is an opportunity for those with a disability to do crafts while parents and friends are able to share support for each other and practical advice to address daily needs of their

Each Gathering is punctuated by a Fiesta, which is a simple snack or meal tied into the theme of the month. The fiesta is also an opportunity to celebrate birthdays and special events in the life of the community.

Faith and Light is an international ministry that was founded by Jean Vanier and Marie-Helene Mathieu some 44 years ago and is now active on every continent of the world.

"It is not a ministry to persons with a disability, it is a ministry with these individuals because they teach us about God's love and acceptance in more profound and beautiful ways than we could ever teach them," Father King continued. \ Faith and Light believes in the words of Saint Paul: "God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong"

Bishop Provost comments on DC "March for Life"

The date of January 22 holds special significance for any of us who hold dear the principle of human life, since it is the anniversary of the Supreme Court decision, commonly referred to as Roe v. Wade. On that date, Washington becomes the rallying point for an enormous "March for Life." When January 22 falls on a day when Congress is not in session, the March takes place on the nearest session date. This year the March was held on Monday, January 24, and I was privileged to participate. That a demonstration of approximately a quarter of million people receives little or no attention in the media is more a commentary on a secular agenda than it is on any lack of zeal and exuberance on the part of the participants.

Most were youth-high school and college age, as well as young adults, a fact

not lost on Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, the homilist for the Vigil Mass for the March and the Chair of the Bishops' Pro-Life Committee. The Mass every year is celebrated in the vast expanse of the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on the eve of the Thousands upon thousands participate, including clergy and laity, seminarians and religious. In his homily, Cardinal DiNardo made mention of the many organizers who needed to be thanked for their interest and assistance with the Vigil and the March. At the end of the list, he said that, like the Wedding of Cana, he had saved the best for last. He wanted to thank the youth present and added this statement addressed to them particularly: "To the astonishment of nature, of the chattering classes, and of the disinterested and jaded media, you have continuously

come forward here and throughout the places where you live to be unflagging witnesses to the inestimable worth of each human being.' The presence of the youth added a hopeful dimension to the March and its accom-

panying activities. A group from the Diocese of Lake Charles joined participants from the Diocese of Lafayette and the Diocese of Baton Rouge. They were a lively component to the March. The entire event, however, had the atmosphere of a pep rally, but with a major difference. During the March, that slowly made its way from the Capital Mall up Constitution Avenue to the Supreme Court, we prayed. We prayed the rosary and since it was the 3 o'clock hour, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. Most of the groups I saw were Catholic. They were singing hymns and songs and joining Byzantine monks chanting their divine office, and devout Orthodox Jews raising their

voices in prayer. All of them braved the cold weather-and it was indeed cold and breezy with temperatures below freezing. Yet, you met sincere and interested people from all parts of the nation-from New England to the Deep South, the Mid-West to the Mountains. What joined them all together was to speak out in favor of the "culture of life" and to warn against the "culture of death."We need that reminder, desperately and now more than ever.

To the many who witnessed to the value of human life, who took the time to travel from great distances, to both Washington and the numerous other marches held throughout the nation, we should be very grateful.

Pro-Life rally draws hundreds of participants on Jan. 22

LAKE CHARLES - A crowd of between 500 and 600 braved the cold to take part in annual Jan. 22 commemoration of the 1973 U.S. Supreme Court decision making abortion legal in the United States - Roe vs. Wade - and the more than 50 million children who have died from abortion. The vent was sponsored the Diocese of Lake Charles and its offices of Pro-Life as well as Youth and Young Adult Ministry of the Diocese and held on the steps and grounds of the Calcasieu Parish Courthouse and in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception.

While the Rosary was recited in the Cathedral, a Concert for Life, with music provided by Nichole Lanthier, Robby Alleman, Kenny Lantier, Matt Didier, Paul Rogers, and Chip Gauthé, was held on the

Courthouse steps. This was followed by the Rally for Life that featured keynote speaker Katie Prejean, a St. Louis Catholic High School graduate and a theology student at the University of Dallas.

"Being "pro-life" is about **pro**claiming life," Prejean said. "It's about saying to the world - we, as people, are distinctly unique, made in the image and likeness of God, and are precious in His sight. That being known, we have to treat one another as He treats us with love, respect, and care. This life is precious and delicate, and worth fighting for! We have to proudly declare that we love life, respect life, defend life, and believe in life!

"Mary, our beloved and blessed Mother, would've been in the perfect position to not choose life," Prejean continued. "She was unwed, young, definitely unemployed, and probably very terrified. And yet, she said

yes! She accepted the remarkable gift of the Word and brought our Savior into the world. Her ves is our model, both to a life of discipleship and a beautiful witness to how we can protect and defend life. Being pro-life means we proclaim life as beautiful and precious, we protect those whose lives are at risk, and we recognize how profound life is and hold it as a lovely gift."

The March for Life, a candlelight procession from the courthouse down Ryan Street, to Pujo, on to Bilbo and into the Cathedral, was followed by a Prayer Service for Life with Rev. Marcus Johnson, Dean of the Central Deanery and Pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic Church, presiding. Members of the Youth and Young Adult Ministry Core Team led a Litany for Life, based on Corinthians (12:31-13:8a). Cathedral
