



Cheryl Riley named "Distinguished Catholic of the Year" by KPC #168

LAKE CHARLES – Mrs. Cheryl Riley received the "Distinguished Catholic of the Year" by St. Peter Claver Court and Council No. 168 of St. Henry Catholic Church, at the second annual Sapphire and Ice Gala.

Proceeds from the event support educational expenses for college-level seminarians studying for the priesthood for the Diocese of Lake Charles and the St. Henry Catholic Church Building Bridges Capital Campaign. Pastors from the parishes of the Diocese provide nominations for the Award.

In his introduction of the 2011 recipient, Msgr. Daniel Torres, pastor of St. Henry, spoke of St. Peter Claver and the care he provided for the slaves of 17th Century Colombia and how Riley, like Peter Claver, follows the commandments and embraces the life of Jesus Christ every day.

"She is a faithful and humble servant," Msgr. Torres said. "She is truly following the model of the Lord. As a teacher, she has always been very involved in the lives of her students."

"A lifetime member of Sacred Heart, she attended Sacred Heart Elementary and graduated from Sacred Heart High School," Msgr. Torres said. Riley completed her Catholic education through graduation from Xavier University of Louisiana in New Orleans. A veteran of more than 30 years of teaching experience in public and parochial schools in Southwest Louisiana, she retired from Sacred Heart/St. Katharine Drexel Catholic

School.

An accomplished musician, she serves as Music Minister at Sacred Heart of Jesus, Immaculate Heart of Mary, St. John Bosco in Westlake and St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Lake Charles, as well as helping with music at funeral masses at many churches in the Diocese.

As a teacher, she has always involved herself in the lives of young people.

"Countless parents and students have said they were unable to grasp math until they entered her class," Msgr. Torres continued. "She continues to tutor students from Sacred Heart/St. Katharine Drexel and from the public school system, refusing to take money for her services."

She attempts to attend high school graduations for all of her former students.

"Recently, she approached the mother of one of her former students to tell her that she had seen the woman's son and was surprised when the child ran over to her and hugged her," Msgr. Torres said. "The parent asked why was she surprised? The student is now in college and he now realizes how instrumental Riley was in molding him into the adult that he had become. The parent also told Riley that she appreciated her mothering her son and countless other students she has taught."

The guest speaker at Sapphire and Ice was Supreme Lady Geralyn Shelvin of the Knights of Peter Claver Ladies Auxiliary.

Local Catholic Charities staff, volunteer go to DC

WASHINGTON, DC – Trish Trejo, the Director of Catholic Charities of Southwest Louisiana and Alison Fontenot, a member of the proposed Advisory Board of Catholic Charities, spent several days in mid-October as the guests of Catholic Charities USA.

While in the Capitol, the pair joined with other members of Catholic Charities agencies around the country in the White House Community Leaders Briefing Series.

On Thursday, October 13 they heard an address by Jon Carson, Director of the Office of Public Engagement for the Obama Administration. Carson expressed his high opinion of the Catholic Church for its work on behalf of the poor. He had the opportunity of working alongside the Church during his two-year service with the Peace Corps and was impressed that the Church had a committed presence in even the most remote areas of the world.

Christopher Kush of Soapbox Consulting, Catholic Charities' advocacy preparation partner for the White House briefing followed with suggestions on getting the message of the needs and concerns of local Catholic Charities agencies to the Obama Administration. He stressed the uniqueness of the opportunity given to Catholic Charities, as a private briefing with the White House rarely, if ever, occurs. This unique opportunity has the potential for forging a meaningful relationship with the White House which would be beneficial to both local Catholic Charities agencies and the larger Catholic Charities USA. The success of the briefing is defined as our ability to maintain the interest of the White House in the work of Catholic Charities.

The evening continued with the celebration of Mass at St. Patrick Catholic Church, the oldest parish in the Federal City of Washington, D.C. by His Eminence Theodore Cardinal McCarrick, Archbishop Emeritus of Washington. The Cardinal is a long-time advocate for Catholic Charities and a champion of the poor.

Following the Mass, participants were transported to the National Press Club for dinner and a panel discussion led by Major Garrett, Congressional Correspondent for National Journal. Among others, the panel included Fr. Larry Snyder, President of Catholic Charities USA.

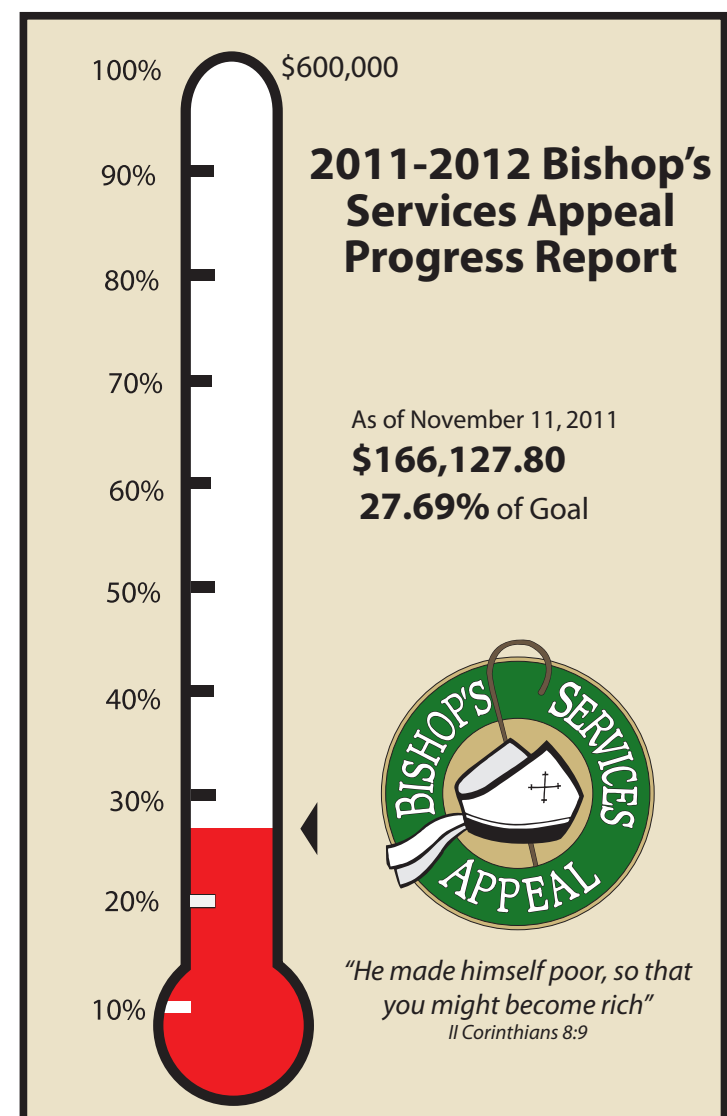

Catholic presence in Prien Lake Mall during Advent

LAKE CHARLES – The second year of the Advent Mall Ministry, a Catholic presence during each weekend of Advent in the Prien Lake Mall, will begin on the first weekend of Advent, Saturday, Nov. 26 and Sunday, Nov. 27, according to Bernell Ezell, Director of the Office of Evangelization for the Diocese of Lake Charles. The program continues over the remaining Advent weekends - Dec. 3-4; Dec. 11-12, and Dec. 17-18.

Just as in 2010, space has been reserved in the Center

Court of the mall, near the theater entrance and the customer service kiosk, where free materials about the Church and the many ministries and programs of the Diocese of Lake Charles will be available to all who are interested. "The tables we will have set up will be staffed by Catholics of all ages and demographics of the Diocese of Lake Charles," said Ezell. "Last year we had an abundance of volunteers in all of the time slots. It went very smooth."

The presence of Bishop

Glen John Provost and a number of priests of the Diocese visited on numerous occasions and energized the volunteers as well as those who stopped for information.

"The free material available this year will once again include church parish brochures, brochures from all Catholic schools in the Diocese, more than 20 titles of informative brochures about the Church, and many spiritual CD's," Ezell said. "We pray that our efforts will once again bear much fruit."

Several interesting en-

counters occurred last year, according to Ezell.

"In a number of instances, conversations between volunteers and interested passers-by turned into an invitation to return to Mass after a long absence," Ezell continued. "Many of our volunteers found that they, though giving of their free time to this ministry, received blessings as well. In reaching out to others they actually learned something about themselves."

The space will be open during the same hours that

the Mall is open on each of the eight weekend days.

CDs from Lighthouse Catholic Media proved to be perhaps the most popular item. "These are very interesting and informative, dealing with many different topics of the Church," Ezell said. "They were also the most expensive item and I thought we had enough for the entire four weekends. However, they were all gone the first two days. Fortunately, we had a generous group that underwrote the purchase of those CDs over the next three

weekends.

The first weekend of Advent will also see the first usage of the new English translation of the Roman Missal, Third Edition in the celebration of the Liturgy.

"Last year we offered a number of different pamphlets on this change," Ezell said. "Now with people seeing the changes, we will offer more information on the subject."

Cormier installed to Ministry of Acolyte

NEW ORLEANS – Matthew Cormier of Sulphur, a seminarian studying for the priesthood for the Diocese of Lake Charles at Notre Dame Seminary, was installed to the Ministry of Acolyte during an Oct. 21 Liturgy at St. Rita Catholic Church. The Most Reverend Shelton Fabre, Auxiliary Bishop of New Orleans, was the installed prelate.

Cormier, a parishioner of Our Lady of LaSalette Church in Sulphur, was among 33 men from 17 dioceses installed as Readers and Acolytes during the celebration.

Those instituted into those ministries have begun exercising them at the Seminary.

In his homily, Bishop Fabre emphasized that these are ministries of service for the people of God, to be made available even when a student for some reason does not continue on to the priesthood. He also noted that when they are ordained deacons and priests the acolytes and readers will take on other roles at the liturgy. The reception of these ministries prepares the seminarians, as it were, for the ministry of priesthood that they will carry out all their lives.

In a 1972 apostolic letter, Pope Paul VI reformed what were known as minor orders, streamlining them into two ministries: Reader and Acolyte. It is required that seminarians be instituted into these ministries before ordination to the diaconate.

The acolyte is appointed in order to aid the deacon and to minister to the priest. It is his duty therefore to at-

tend to the service of the altar and to assist the deacon and the priest in liturgical celebrations, especially in the celebration of Mass. He is also to distribute communion as a special minister when the ministers spoken of in the *Codex Iuris Canonici* can. 845 are not available or are prevented by ill health, age, or another pastoral ministry from performing this function, or when the number of communicants is so great that the celebration of Mass would be unduly prolonged.

In the same extraordinary circumstances, an acolyte may be entrusted with publicly exposing the Blessed Sacrament for adoration by the faithful and afterward replacing it, but not with blessing the people. He may also, to the extent needed, take care of instructing other faithful who on a temporary

basis are appointed to assist the priest or deacon in liturgical celebrations by carrying the missal, cross, candles, etc., or by performing other such duties. He will perform these functions more worthily if he participates in the Holy Eucharist with increasingly fervent devotion, receives nourishment from it, and deepens his knowledge about it.

As one set aside in a special way for the service of the altar, the acolyte should learn all matters concerning public divine worship and strive to grasp their inner spiritual meaning. In that way he will be able each day to offer himself entirely to God, be an example to all by his gravity and reverence in church, and have a sincere love for the Mystical Body of Christ, the people of God, especially for the weak and the sick.
