# Catholic schools to open for 2012-2013

LAKE CHARLES - Catholic schools in the Diocese of Lake Charles will soon open their doors for the new school year. Our Lady Immaculate Catholic School in Jennings gets a head start, with classes beginning on Friday, August 10. This corresponds with the beginning of the public schools in Jefferson Davis Parish.

Catholic schools in Calcasieu Parish start the fall term on Wednesday, August 15, which is the same opening day for public schools. The seven Catholic schools in the Diocese are St. Louis Catholic High School, Immaculate Conception Catholic School, St. Margaret of Scotland Catholic School, Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic School, all in Lake Charles; St. Theodore's Holy Family Catholic School in Moss Bluff; Our Lady's Catholic School in Sulphur; and Our Lady Immaculate Catholic

The first day will see students with a full schedule of classes rather than the abbreviated schedule from previous years.

School in Jennings.

Kimberlee Gazzolo, Superintendent of Catholic Schools, is looking forward to the opening day. "I think we are fortunate this year in that the enrollment is prob-

previous years, perhaps a decrease of only a few percent," Gazzolo said. "I have had reports from the school administrators that a lot of new families are coming into the Diocese. Not just Pre-K and kindergarten, but in the other grades as well. Also, two of the schools are accepting scholarship students - Our Lady's School in Sulphur and Holy Family School in Moss Bluff.

Holy Family will have 17 scholarship students while Our Lady's School will have 10 students. Those schools made the decision to participate in the Louisiana Scholarship Program, which was passed during the recent Legislative session and signed into law by Governor Bobby Jindal.

"Their decision strictly voluntary," Gazzolo said. "They decided whether to participate or not based on space available in each school and discussions with the Office of Catholic Schools. their local school board, the pastor and the school admin-

Holy Family School will also be participating in the state Pre-K Four program, now sponsored by the Louisiana Department of Education. The program originated in 2001 to four-year-old children not currently enrolled in publicly funded pre-K classes. The purpose of the program is to provide high quality early childhood education to four-year-old children who are at risk for learning difficulties and to improve the children's readiness to begin school.

"Holy Family had five slots for the program available and have filled three," Gazzolo said. "Those students, if they are income eligible, will receive tuition free Pre-K 4 education and also will receive a priority slot for a scholarship going into kindergarten level as long as their eligibility remains.

Principals and presidents at each of the seven Catholic schools remain in place for the 2012-2013 school year. "We are very blessed that all have remained with us," Gazzolo continued. "They are all very dedicated and experienced administrators.

"There will be 35 new teachers this year and there have also been some changes in personnel other than instructional staff at the schools," she said. "Susan Percle moved from Immaculate Conception Cathedral Catholic School to St. Louis as development director and Stephen Starr, the former Director of Religious Education at Holy Family, will be working with campus ministry at St. Louis."

St. Louis will also kickoff an exciting technology initiative with the One-to-One laptop program, providing students with access to the latest technology at all times.

"The trend toward technology is not stopping," Gazzolo said. "What students used to do on computers in the 8th grade, they do now it in the younger years.'

Teachers at St. Louis had the benefit of having laptops last year and trained on how to use the programs for immediate feed back with the students, Gazzolo noted. "There was also a group of 30-35 students who had computers last year to aid in their transition this year," she said. "One thing that is so exciting with the laptops is that we are meeting the students where they are. During the school day, they have traditionally used paper, pencil, and notebooks. They then go home and their hands never leave the laptop whether it be the laptop, whether it be their iPad, their iPhone. They are constantly interacting and getting immediate feedback. That will now happen during the school day.

"That's very exciting because it's bringing their world where we have the Smart Boards, document scanners and cameras but where they are actually working on their computer," Gazzolo contin-ued. "It is exciting for them because they are going to be more engaged, more on target. It will allow teachers to see right away where students need extra intervention.'

Though there will still be printed textbooks in the school, the computers will provide the students with better opportunities to study and advance more rapidly.

"It is a predominant philosophy in Catholic schools that parents, students and educators work together to create an education that is world class but I think in this sense having that student be actively engaged at the time will make a great deal of difference at the high school level," she said. "Some of the junior highs are looking into one-to-one laptop programs there as well."

Every summer is a time for schools to clean and freshen up their campuses. In some instances, it is a larger job than in others.

At Immaculate Conception Cathedral School, the new South Annex of the school will be ready for opening day. The completed project, which

broke ground in April 2011, provides for a library/computer lab on the first floor, an art room on the second in addition to four classrooms on the first and second floors that will allow for the elimination of temporary classrooms on the campus. The third floor can be easily completed when the space is required because

NEW YORK -- Ruth Guidry of Sulphur, a member of Our Lady of LaSalette Court #1255 of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas, is the new National Director of the Catholic Daughters, elected at the group's recent 54th Biennial National Convention in Omaha, Nebraska. Guidry will begin her two-

year term on August 16. The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, has asked that during the hurricane season of 2012 the people of the Diocese of Lake Charles pray the following prayer, composed by The Most Reverend Maurice Schexnayder, Second Bishop of Lafayette, following Hurricane Audrey in 1957:

O God, Master of this passing world, hear the humble voices of your children. The Sea of Galilee obeyed your order and returned to its quietude. You are still the Master of the land and sea. We live in the shadow of a danger over which we have no control: the Gulf, like a provoked and angry giant, can awake from its seeming lethargy, and overstep its conventional boundaries, invade our land and spread chaos and disaster.

During this hurricane season we turn to You, O loving Father. Spare us from past tragedies whose memories are still so vivid and whose wounds seem to refuse to heal with the passing of time. O Virgin, Star of the Sea, Our Beloved Mother, we ask you to plead with your Son in our behalf, so that spared from the calamities common to this area and animated with a true spirit of gratitude, we will walk in the footsteps of your Divine Son to reach the heavenly Jerusalem where a stormless eternity awaits us. Amen.
