



“Year of Faith” begins on Oct. 11

LAKE CHARLES – Slightly more than a year ago, Pope Benedict XVI declared that a “Year of Faith” would begin on Thursday, Oct. 11, throughout the world, and conclude on Nov. 24, 2013. Next week marks the 50th anniversary of the opening of the Second Vatican Council and is also the 20th anniversary of the publication of the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

During this Year of Faith, Catholics are asked to study and reflect on the documents of Vatican II and the Catechism so that they may deepen their knowledge of the faith.

In his Apostolic Letter *Porto Fidei*, the Holy Father said, “The ‘door of faith’ is always open for us, ushering us into the life of communion with God and offering entry into his Church.”

Here in the Diocese of Lake Charles, Bishop Glen John Provost has urged all parishes to plan events that will help parishioners to do as the Holy Father asked and deepen their knowledge of the faith.

Bishop Provost will lead a Marian Pilgrimage for Life and Liberty on Sunday, Oct. 7, at the Shrine of Our Lady Star of the Sea in Cameron beginning at 4 p.m.

Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church has also announced plans to show the dramatic presentation *Catholicism*, created by Father Robert Barron, during the Year of Faith. The 10-part series will

begin on Monday, Oct. 8, at 6 p.m. in the Irving A. DeBlanc Family Life Center. Other fall showings are set for the same time on the Mondays of Oct. 15, Oct. 22, Oct. 29, and Nov. 12. The second five sections will



be presented in the spring. Contact the parish office at 337-477-1236 for additional information.

Father Marcus Johnson, pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic Church in Lake Charles, will moderate faith formation sessions using “Catholicism” in the church’s Founders Hall beginning at 6:15 p.m. on Tuesdays – Oct. 16 and 30, Nov. 13 and 27, Dec. 11, Jan. 8 and 22, Feb. 5 and 26, and March 12.

St. Theodore Catholic Church in Moss Bluff and its study group, SALT, will host the 10-week session showing the *Catholicism* series beginning Monday, Oct. 15, at 6:30 p.m. in the SALT room. This will continue each Monday

through, Jan. 7, 2013, with the exception of Christmas and New Year’s Eve. Call 337-855-6662 for more information.

This is not the first time that a Pope has called upon the faithful to dedicate themselves to deepening their understanding of a particular aspect of the faith. In 1967, Pope Paul VI announced a Year of Faith commemorating the 19th centenary of the martyrdom of Sts. Peter and Paul. That Year of Faith called upon the Church to recall the supreme act of witness by these two saints so that their martyrdom might inspire the present day Church to collectively and individually make a sincere profession of faith.

Pope Benedict’s call for this Year of Faith is an opportunity for Catholics to experience a conversion – to turn back to Jesus and enter into a deeper relationship with him.

The Synod on the New Evangelization, which will be a gathering of bishops, selected from different areas of the world, meeting with the Holy Father to discuss questions pertaining to the activity of the Church in the world, begins on Oct. 7 continuing until Oct. 28. This meeting of bishops helps to foster a closer unity between the bishops and the pope, and provides counsel to the Holy Father.

The New Evangelization is a call to each Catholic to deepen his or her own faith, have confidence in the Gospel, and possess a willingness to share

the Gospel. The New Evangelization is first and foremost a personal encounter with Jesus Christ; it is an invitation to deepen one’s relationship with Christ. It is also a call to each person to share his or her faith with others. The Year of Faith, just like the New Evangelization, calls Catholics to conversion in order to deepen their relationship with Christ and to share it with others.

Recently Bishop David Ricken of Green Bay, Wisconsin, offered “10 Ways Catholics Can Live the Year of Faith.” Rooted in guidelines from the Vatican’s Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, some of these suggestions are already requirements for Catholics; others can be embraced by Catholics at all times and especially during the Year of Faith.

The 10 guidelines include: participate in Mass; go to Confession; learn about the lives of the saints, read the Bible daily, read the documents of Vatican II, study the Catechism, volunteer in the parish, help those in need, invite a friend to Mass, and incorporate the Beatitudes into daily life.

Sixty-third seminary bourse is established

ELTON – A new seminary bourse, the 63rd such fund that will aid in financing the cost of the education of men studying for the priesthood for the Diocese of Lake Charles, has been established in memory of Ola Mae and F. M. Thornton of Elton. This new bourse brings the amount invested to \$1,310,741.82.

The Thorntons were members of St. Paul Catholic Church in Elton. Mrs. Thornton, a native of Elton, died on December 6, 2010. Her husband predeceased her, on June 25, 2001.

Only the interest earned on the investment of the funds is used to defray the seminarians educational expenses.

A seminary bourse is a permanent fund set aside to provide income for the education and training of future priests.

World Mission Sunday, October 21

World Mission Sunday, organized by the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, is a day set aside for Catholics worldwide to recommit themselves to the Church’s missionary activity through prayer and sacrifice. This year World Mission Sunday is October 21.

As described by Pope John Paul II, World Mission Sunday is “an important day in the life of the Church because it teaches how to give: as an offering made to God, in the Eucharistic celebration and for all the missions of the world” (*Redemptoris Missio* 81).

Every year the needs of the Catholic Church in the Missions grow - as new dioceses are formed, as new seminaries are opened because of the growing number of young men hearing Christ’s call to follow Him as priests, as areas devastated by war or natural disaster are rebuilt, and as other areas, long suppressed, are opening up to hear the message of Christ and His Church. That is why the involvement and commitment of Catholics from around the world is so urgently needed. Offerings from Catholics in the United States, on World Mission Sunday and throughout the year, are combined with offerings to the Propagation of the Faith worldwide.

This year, World Mission Sunday is celebrated as we begin the Year of Faith (October 2012 through November

2013), which Pope Benedict XVI prays will bring “renewed energy to the mission of the whole Church, to lead men and women out of the desert toward friendship with Christ Who gives fullness of life.”

Noting that the Year of Faith is a “good opportunity to intensify the witness of charity,” the Pope is also calling all Catholics to be part of a greater Prayer Movement

focused on the Person of Jesus Christ and faith in Him.

Just as our young church here in the United States received support in the 19th century from the Catholics of Europe through the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, so too the growing churches in the Developing World today also require financial help. Your generosity will help make a faith-filled difference around the world!

A gift of \$15 is a week’s support of a young man in a mission seminary; a gift of \$25 is a month’s help for the formation of a religious Sister in the Pacific Islands; a gift of \$50 helps provide care for one of the 50 children at a home in Zambia; or a gift of \$100 covers the cost of a desk and textbook for five of the 300 children in catechism class at a parish on the Galápagos Islands off Ecuador.

Bishop Provost to lead Marian Pilgrimage Sunday, Oct. 7

CAMERON – Bishop Glen John Provost will lead a Marian Pilgrimage for Life and Liberty to the Shrine of Our Lady Star of the Sea beginning at 4 p.m. on Sunday, October 7, in the Church of Our Lady Star of the Sea.

October 7 is also Respect Life Sunday as well as the feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary.

In a letter to the people of the Diocese of Lake Charles, Bishop Provost wrote, "I write to you on the important topic of religious liberty, our concern to protect the rights of religious conscience that we enjoy as God's gift to us and assured in our country's Bill of Rights. We should be troubled by the increasing threat to our consciences as we seek to protect human life and oppose abortion, euthanasia, and other activities that threaten human life in our society. The threats are real and those who promote them are de-

termined. With the help of God's grace, we, who speak for the unborn and the vulnerable, should be at least as determined and concerned."

On October 7, 1571, the Christian world faced another threat and a great naval battle was fought. At the request of Pope St. Pius V, a league of mostly Catholic European countries provided a fleet of warships and men to protect Europe from an invasion by the Turkish navy. Historians say the Turkish force's ultimate goal was to invade Europe and take Rome. The Christian and Turkish navies met at a place known as Lepanto off the coast of Greece. The Christian navy was victorious, and Europe was spared. In thanksgiving, Pope St. Pius V declared the Feast of Our Lady of Victory be celebrated on that date. In 1573, it became known as the Feast of the Rosary, because the victory was attributed

to the intercession of Mary through the praying of the rosary.

The Marian Pilgrimage will consist of praying Evening Prayer and the rosary together and then processing to the Shrine reciting the Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Since the Shrine in Cameron enjoys the privilege of being "spiritually affiliated" with the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome, for those who have confessed their sins, attended Sunday Mass, and participated in the pilgrimage, a Plenary Indulgence will be granted.

Bishop Provost invited all people of good will to participate and anyone who is concerned about the protection of human life, respect for conscience, and the preservation of our "first and most cherished liberty," religious freedom, is welcome to join us, the Bishop noted.

Our Lady Queen of Heaven School opens "Cornerstone Capital Campaign"

LAKE CHARLES -- Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic School has embarked on its much-anticipated "Cornerstone Capital Campaign," continuing on its journey of "Building a Foundation of Faith."

At the school's opening liturgy on Sept. 7, Msgr. James Gaddy, pastor of Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church commissioned every student, faculty member, and parent to the commitment of the project. The campaign will raise funds to construct a new middle-school building and a new Early-Childhood Center, renovate existing buildings, and consolidate all pre-Kindergarten through 8th grade classes on the main campus west of Creole Street. "OLQH School has provided outstanding Catholic education to our community

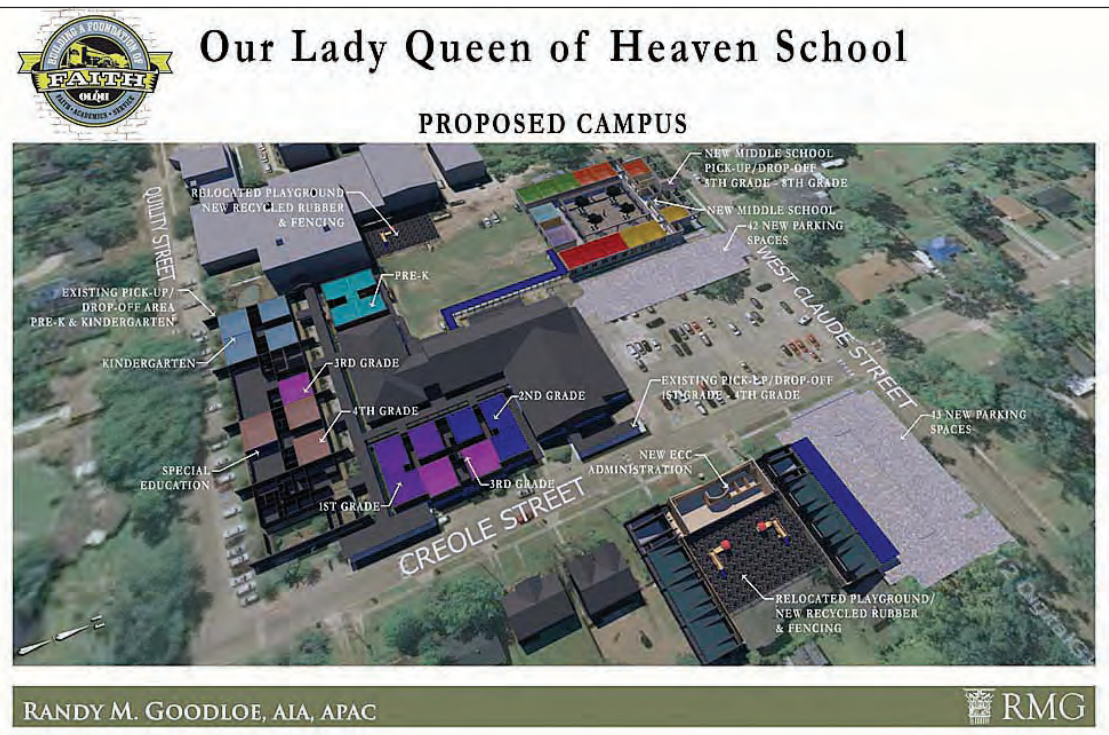
for 55 years, with generations of alumni using that education as a cornerstone in their lives, Msgr. Gaddy said. "That's a great legacy. Now we're looking to the future, to continue that legacy—it's time to prepare the school for the next generations of students."

The school opened in 1958 with 24 students. Its facilities and enrollment have grown through the years, now accommodating some 700 pre-Kindergarten through 8th grade students and 55 children at the Early Childhood Center. Principal JoAnn Wallwork said, "This campaign will provide a new, modern, spacious environment for all our students. It will allow us to create a true middle-school model with a dedicated building for those students. All the buildings

will be fitted with today's technology to accommodate all learning styles. The unified campus will increase the safety of our students and parents. And last, but not least, the new plan gives the campus better traffic flow and additional parking."

"The goal for the campaign is \$3.5 million," said Frank Wood, a member of the campaign's executive committee. "The school and the church parish have been preparing financially for several years to provide a jump start for this campaign. Together, they committed \$1 million to get the campaign rolling."
