



Matthew Cormier Diaconate Ordination Saturday, May 18

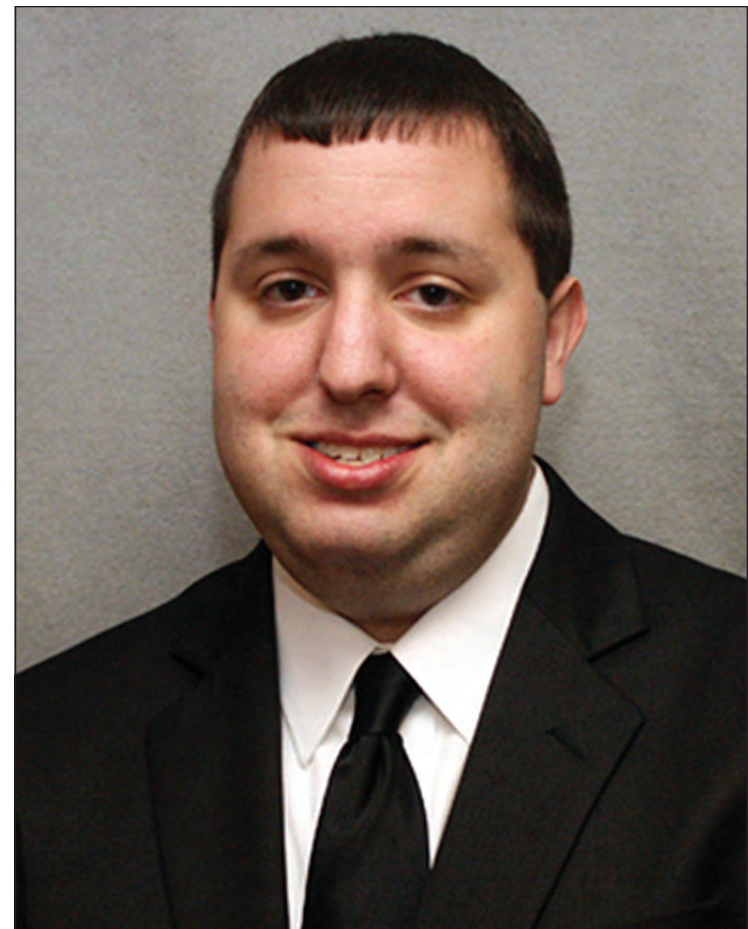
LAKE CHARLES – Matthew Cormier, a seminarian studying for the priesthood for the Diocese of Lake Charles, will be ordained a Deacon on Saturday, May 18, at 10 a.m. a Liturgy in Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church celebrated by the Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles.

Cormier, a parishioner of Our Lady of LaSalette Catholic Church in Sulphur, recently made his Profession of Faith and the took the Oath of Fidelity during a liturgy at Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans. The ordination to the transitional diaconate is the penultimate step to his priestly ordination for the Diocese next year.

“This is an exciting time,” Cormier said. “I will soon be lying prostrate as the Church sings her litany invoking the powerful intercession of the all the saints in heaven. After this, the Bishop will lay hands on and pray the prayer of ordination over me and I will be forever configured to Christ, the Servant of all. The word Deacon comes from the Greek *diakonia*, which means “servant.” The prayers of the Rite of Ordination frequently invoke this reality of service.

“I offer my humble gratitude first to Almighty God for having made me and called me to this life,” he continued. “Secondly, I thank the Blessed Mother for her maternal intercession and protection. In this world, firstly I thank my parents who brought me into this world and gave me all the love humanly possible and then some. I thank Bishop Provost. I still vividly remember our first one on one meeting. It was at the end of the application process and just a few days after his ordination and installation as Bishop. I remember being very nervous but as soon as he entered the room; his calm and fatherly presence put me very much at ease. I will very soon be kneeling before him, promising my sincere respect and obedience.

“I thank all the formators, both in the seminary and the diocese who have helped me along this journey. I also come from a wonderful home parish who stood by me and my family through years of childhood illness and who have supported me in an amazing way through this discernment. Last, but certainly not least, I thank all the people whom I have served. You have been profoundly influential in my vocation.”

The nationwide Fortnight for Freedom starts on the vigil

of the Feasts of St. John Fisher and St. Thomas More - Friday, June 21 - and continues to Independence Day - July 4.

Last year’s inaugural event, called for by the bishops of the United States, saw a great diversity of events across the country and in 2013, the Church and its faithful continue to face many challenges to religious liberty, including the August 1, the deadline for religious organizations to comply with the Health and Human Services mandate. There are also potential Supreme Court rulings that could redefine marriage in June, causing serious religious liberty issues for Catholic adoption agencies and many others; and religious liberty concerns in other areas, such as immigration and humanitarian services. Other recent religious freedom issues that have come to light include the Department of Defense (DOD) listing of the Catholic Church as a terror threat along with such organizations as El Qaeda, Evangelical Christians, the Ku Klux Klan and Sunni Muslims as well as others or the recent prohibition from

During the Fortnight, the liturgical calendar celebrates a series of great martyrs who remained faithful in the face of persecution by political power—St. John the Baptist, SS. Peter and Paul, the First Martyrs of the Church of Rome, St. John Fisher, and St. Thomas More. Through prayer, study, and peaceful public during this year’s Fortnight for Freedom,

we hope to remind ourselves and others all throughout the United States about the importance of preserving the fundamental right of religious freedom.

The 2013 Fortnight for Freedom is part of a movement for life, marriage and religious liberty launched by the U.S. Catholic Bishops that addresses critical life, marriage, and religious liberty concerns. The five-part strategy, or call to prayer, for this year was approved by the bishops in November and began after Christmas 2012. The overall focus was to invite Catholics to pray for rebuilding a culture favorable to life and marriage and for increased protections of religious liberty.

Mass to Avert Storms May 29 in Cameron

CAMERON – Bishop Glen John Provost will celebrate a Mass to Avert Storms at 5 p.m., Wednesday, May 29, at Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church and Shrine. The 2013 Hurricane Season begins on Saturday, June 1.

This event will constitute a Diocesan pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady Star of the Sea following last year’s privilege for the Shrine to be affiliated with the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome. Pilgrims prayerfully visiting the Shrine on May 29 can gain the same spiritual benefits as if they had visited the Basilica itself. Such a pilgrimage provides a plenary indulgence with the fulfillment of certain requirements, which include recent confession, reception of Holy Communion, prayers

for the Holy Father, and the recitation of the Creed.

Bishop Provost has also asked that during this year’s storm season that the people of the Diocese of Lake Charles pray the prayer composed by The Most Reverend Maurice Schexnayder, Second Bishop of Lafayette, in 1957 following the Hurricane Audrey.

In addition, the Bishop has invited everyone to make June 7, First Friday, a day of fasting and prayer for the intention of being spared storms and destructive weather during the hurricane season.

The Bishop will travel to Creole following the Mass to bless the newly constructed parish hall at Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church.

Poems republished for charity

LAKE CHARLES – Father Don Piraro, Director-Emeritus of Saint Charles Center and a retired priest of the Diocese of Lake Charles, has re-published a collection of poems – “*Bisacquino*” and *Other Poems* – for the benefit of two local non-profit service organizations – Abraham’s Tent and Catholic Charities of Southwest Louisiana.

The book will be available free of charge from Crossroads Bookstore, 601 West Prien Lake Road and at Tabor Retreat House of Saint Charles Center, 2151 Sam Houston Jones Parkway in Moss Bluff.

“This collection of poems was originally published in 1978 for a workshop for vowed religious women serving in the Diocese of Lafayette,” Father Piraro said. “Then as now, I am giving the copies away. But, I ask: if you enjoy the poems, that you make a donation to Abraham’s Tent or Catholic Char-

ities of Southwest Louisiana.”

According to Father Piraro, many of the poems came out of the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius. “They were made in the summer of 1976 at Ignatius House in Guelph, Ontario,” he said. “They reflect the graces of the Four Weeks of the Exercises. They are not polished poems: they were dashed off in my journal.

“For this edition, I have supplemented them with several others that were written later,” Father Piraro continued. “To differentiate between them and the earlier poems, I include the date of their compositions.”

The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola were composed in the 16th Century and is still in use as part of the spiritual formation of the members of the Society of Jesus. They are the source for both the Jesuit Preached Retreat and the Silent Directed Retreat.

LC native aiding cause of Father Augustus Tolton

CHICAGO - His Excellency, The Most Reverend Joseph N. Perry, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Chicago, in his capacity as Diocesan Postulator for the Cause for Sainthood of Father Augustus Tolton, has appointed Lake Charles native A. Gerard Jordan, O'Praem., as his special assistant. Brother Jordan will help with popularizing the cause of Father Tolton through public speaking events, fundraisers, and educational programs.

He is a native son of Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic Church and is currently the only African-American seminarian studying at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago.

Brother Jordan is a professed member of the Order of Canons Regular of Prémontré (Norbertines) at Daylesford Abbey in Paoli, Pa. and a candidate for priesthood. He continues his discernment to become a solemnly professed and ordained canon and priest of

the Church. His sister Altha M. Jordan Green resides in Lake Charles.

Servant of God Augustine John Tolton (April 1, 1854 - July 9, 1897), or Augustus Tolton, was the first Roman Catholic priest in the United States publicly known to be black when he was ordained in 1886. James Augustine Healy, ordained in 1854, and Patrick Francis Healy, ordained in 1864 were of mixed-race. A former slave who was baptized and reared Catholic, Tolton studied formally in Rome. He was ordained in Rome on Easter Sunday at the Cathedral-Archbasilica of St. John Lateran. Assigned to the diocese of Alton (now Diocese of Springfield) in Illinois, he first ministered to his home parish in Quincy, Illinois. Later assigned to Chicago, Father Tolton led the development and construction of St. Monica's Catholic Church as a black "national parish church", completed in 1893 at 36th and Dearborn Streets on Chicago's South Side.

Francis Cardinal George, Archbishop of Chicago, opened the official investigation into Father Tolton's life and virtues with a view to opening the Cause for his canonization on March 2, 2010.

On February 24, 2011 formal introduction of the cause for sainthood of Fr. Tolton took place and he was designated Servant of God - Fr. Augustus Tolton. More information on the cause can be found at <http://www.toltoncanonization.org/>.
