Class of 2013 at St. Louis Catholic numbers 141

LAKE CHARLES -- Bishop Glen John Provost was the featured speaker at the 2013 commencement ceremonies for 141 graduates of

St. Louis Catholic High School.

In his remarks, Bishop Provost used the words of Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman, when he told the graduates, "God has created me to do Him some definite service; He has committed some work to me which He has not committed to another; I have my mission—I may never know it in this life, but I shall be told it in the next.'

Continuing with the quote from Cardinal Newman, the Bishop said, "I am a link in the chain, a bond of connection between persons. He has not created me for nothing. I shall do good; I shall do His work. I shall be an angel of peace, a preacher of truth in my own place while not intending it—if I do but keep His commandments. Therefore, I will trust Him, whatever, wherever, I am. I can never be thrown away. If I am in sickness, my sickness may serve Him; in perplexity, my perplexity may serve Him; if I am in sorrow, my sorrow may serve Him. He does nothing in vain. He knows what He is about. He may take away my friends, He may throw me among strangers, He may make me feel desolate, make my spirits sink, hide my future from me—still He knows what He is about.'

Class Valedictorian was Margaret Lie while co-salutatorians were Sarah France and Milissa Snider. All three made brief remarks to their classmates, teachers, parents, and those in attendance.

Bishop Provost and Father Marcus Johnson, the rector of St. Louis, presented the St. Louis Awards to France and Wesley Guidry. The St. Louis Award goes to a male and female senior student voted as the outstanding Christian student at the school by their peers and approved by members of the faculty.

The awards, made possible the Lake Charles Serra Club, are presented to students who have shown Love of God and Neighbor, Strong Moral Character, Desire to Serve Community, Courage to Stand up for Christian Principles, a Daily Christian Lifestyle, and Proper Use of God-Given gifts.

Scholarships offered to the Class of 2013 totaled \$2,911,588 and are not inclusive of Louisiana TOPS funding, which will not be known until later in June.

OLQH School breaks ground for new middle-school building

Catholic School broke ground recently for its new middleschool building, and the facility is expected to be ready for the pening of the 2014–2015 school year.

The one-story, 26,500-square-foot middle-school building will house fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades, and will include classrooms, administrative offices, a teachers' lounge and a brick-paved courtyard. A covered walkway will connect the new building to the cafeteria and other campus buildings.

"This new facility will allow us all the advantages of a true middle-school model," said principal JoAnn Wallwork. "The building will be spacious, filled with new technology, and designed to serve the learning needs of our middle-school stu-

Bishop Glen John Provost led a group of honorary groundbreakers that turned the first spadefuls of earth on the north end of the campus near West Claude Street. Wielding shovels were Msgr. James Gaddy, pastor of Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church; Catholic School's Superintendent Kimberlee Gazzolo; OLQH School Principal JoAnn Wallwork; St. Martin de Porres Pastor Father Keith Pellerin; student council officer Quinn Roan; Gretchen Jester and Frank Wood, leaders of the Cornerstone Capital Campaign; Lake Charles Mayor Randy Roach; Calcasieu Parish Police Juror Chris Landry; Lake Charles City Council Member Stuart Weatherford; and project architect Randy M. Goodloe.

The groundbreaking ceremony was attended by parents, friends, donors and the entire student body. Msgr. Gaddy told the gathering, "As a community, we place our first attention on the education of our children. Your commitment and generosity have led to this new milestone in our school's rich history a state-of-the-art middle-school building.'

The new building is the first phase of a three-phase facility improvement project funded by donations to the Cornerstone Capital Campaign. Phase Two involves renovation of the present school building and relocation of some grades. Phase Three will move the Early Childhood Center into a renovated school building on the east side of Creole Street, and the old Early Childhood Center building will be demolished to create 43 new parking spaces. The Cornerstone Capital Campaign has achieved 90 percent of its \$3.5 million goal.

The project also brings safety and traffic-flow benefits to the school by consolidating all kindergarten through eighthgrade students onto a unified campus west of Creole Street, eliminating the need for students to cross the street during the
