In photo two, Bourriaque receives the Caritas Award from Sr. Mary Vianney and Bishop Provost, while Deacon Lavine, honored for his more than 30 years as a deacon and his generosity to the poor, receives the St. Peter Claver Award in photo three from Sister Mary Vianney and the Bishop. The honor came in the form of an Apostolic Blessing from Pope Francis.

Four honored at Catholic Charities Jazz Brunch

LAKE CHARLES - Four individuals, two posthumously, were honored at the 2016 Catholic Charities of Southwest Louisiana Jazz Brunch for their generous contributions of self and resources to aid those most in need of assistance in Southwest

Posthumous awards were given to local philanthropists Russell Stutes, Sr. and Billy Navarre. Both men will be remembered in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass offered at Catholic Charities

In making those presentations Sr. Mary Vianney Walsh, RSM, director of Catholic Charities, talked about Stutes and

About Stutes, she said, "He had many of the manly and gentle characteristics of St. Joseph, husband of Mary and stepfather of Jesus. He was a man of quiet virtue whose faith guided him and was the source of his strong character, which reflected his integrity in relationships and workmanship. He was successful in his business because of the quality of work performed. He taught his children to be good to people, be a forgiving and kind human being and not to focus on worldly things.

Sr. Mary Vianney said, that Navarre "leaves behind to the community of Lake Charles a legacy of benevolent giving. He provided aid to those who sought assistance for the poor, handicapped, or marginalized as well as for many youth programs and education for our youth. As a businessman, he gave back to the community, and he built people up by challenging them to not be afraid to be their best. He was a godly man who lived

Many family members of Russell Stutes were present and his wife Cissy accepted the honor while Tim Broussard was present representing Billy Navarre's family, receiving the accolades from Sister and Bishop Glen John Provost.

Also honored for their continuing work aiding Catholic Charities and those in need throughout Southwest Louisiana were Ryan Bourriaque of St. Eugene Catholic Church in Grand Layine, a former director of Catholic Charities as well as former Interim Secretary for Pastoral Services and currently serving as Coordinator of Ministry, Office of Black Catholics and Prison Ministry, who was honored with the St. Peter Claver Award.

The Caritas Award goes to someone who exemplifies a life of selfless giving. The St. Peter Claver Award is for one who demonstrates a particular love for the poor.

Bourriaque, a native of Cameron Parish, was formed as a child by great-grandparents, grandparents, and his parents into a close knit Cajun community, according to Sr. Mary Vianney. He left the area to go to college and work but was drawn to return with his wife and family.

"After Hurricane Rita and later Ike, the social fabric of Cameron was stripped away," Sr. Mary Vianney said. "Bryan returned as Parish Administrator and did the work necessary to provide his children and others the opportunity to be raised in the same culture in which he was raised. He fought for the people of Cameron, fought to rebuild the communities and represented their right to return to their homes when the Federal government wanted to keep them away."

An image of Our Lady of Guadalupe, which serves as a "symbol of unity among diversity," was emblazoned on the Caritas Award. Bourriaque will also have his intentions for the restoration and renewal of faith and livelihood of Cameron Parish remembered at each Mass offered at Catholic Charities until the end of April 2017.

Deacon Lavine, who celebrated 30 years of ordination as a permanent deacon and is now in his 31st year, was honored with a Papal Blessing from the Holy Father, Pope Francis.

"He continues to celebrate these years of dedication to the church and to Sacred Heart Parish," Sr. Mary Vianney said. "He has a heart for those who are poor and those who are marginalized. He pours out every ounce of his gifts, financial means, and compassion and concern to all who approach him.'

Father Keith Pellerin, pastor of St. Philip Neri Catholic Church in Kinder, presented an accapella medley for the crowd's listening pleasure.

Sr. Mary Vianney also presented her annual report along with an video of the work done by Catholic Charities, including comments by staff and volunteers as well as remarks from individuals helped during the year through the aid of the orga-

LAKE CHARLES - The Reverend Archimandrite Herbert as pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary in Lake Charles, and J. May, J.C.L., 64, Pastor of Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish in Creole and Our Lady Star of the Sea Parish in Cameron, died Monday, May 9, 2016, in a local hospital.

He was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Lafayette on Nov. 14, 1975, by The Most Rev. Gerard L. Frey, Bishop of Lafayette, in St. Margaret of Scotland Catholic Church in Lake

His parents, Herbert J. May Sr. and Francesca Tramonte May, and a sister, Frances M. Compton predeceased him. He is survived by one sister, Phyllis May of Welsh; along with numerous cousins, including four seminarians of the Diocese of Lake Charles

A native of Lake Charles, Father May's seminary studies came at the University of Dallas and Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans, where he earned a Master of Theological Studies. He attended McNeese State University earning a Bachelor of Arts before his seminary studies.

He did post graduate work at the University of Southwestern Sepulcher of Jerusalem. Father May was a member of the or-Louisiana (now ULL) gaining a Master of Arts in History and Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., graduating with a Licentiate in Canon Law.

Assignments following his priestly ordination, included as Parochial Vicar at St. Anthony of Padua Parish in Eunice, Our Lady Help of Christians Parish in Jennings, St. Martin de Tours Parish in St. Martinville, and St. Bernard Parish in Breaux Bridge. He also served as chaplain at Bethany Nursing Home in Lafayette.

He transferred to the Diocese of Lake Charles in 1981 and assigned as Parochial Vicar at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Lake Charles. He was appointed Administrator on two separate occasions of St. Mary of the Lake Parish in Big Lake and was Administrator at St. John Vianney in

He was in residence at St. Raphael Parish in Iowa, and then St. Theodore Parish in Moss Bluff. Father May also served as Parochial Vicar at Our Lady Queen of Heaven in Lake Charles, and Priest in Charge of St. Joseph Parish in Welsh. He served

was appointed Administrator of Our Lady of Seven Dolors Parish in Welsh, then named Pastor. He served there until July 2014 when he was named to Sacred Heart and Our Lady Star of the Sea. Father May served in numerous administrative assignments in the Diocese, including Vice Officialis of the Tribunal, Director of the Tribunal, Judicial Vicar of the Tribunal, Adjunct Judicial Vicar, and Promoter of Justice of

the Tribunal. He was a member of the Diocesan Personnel Board and chair of the Senate of Priests.

He served as Diocesan Chaplain of the Companions of Honor. He was a member of the Military and Hospitaller Order of St. Lazarus of Jerusalem and served as a Senior Chaplain of the Order as well as having received one of the Order's highest honors, the Companionate of Merit in the rank of Knight. He was chaplain of the Bishop Jude Speyrer Chapter of Pontifical Knights and Dames and a Knight of the Military and Equestrian Order of the Holy

der of Fleur De Lis. He was appointed Grand Archimandrite of the Church of Antioch by His Beatitude Maximos V. Hakim in May 1988. Father May was a member of the Canon Law Society of America (Press Officer and Consultor); the Conference of Chancery/Tribunal Officials of the Provinces of New Orleans and Mobile (President); and the Society for the Law of the Oriental Churches.

The Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated for Father May by The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles with concelebrants Reverend Monsignor Daniel Torres, Reverend Carolos Garcia, and The Very Reverend Aubrey Guilbeau in the Cathedral on Thursday, May 12. Interment was in Graceland Cemetery under the direction of Johnson Funeral Home. Visitation and a Scripture Service, led by Father Garcia, was Wednesday in the Cathedral. Monsignor Torres presented the homily at the Scripture Service.
