# Diocese hosting tour honoring Our Lady of Fatima centennial

LAKE CHARLES -- The world-famous International Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima, traveling worldwide since 1947, is on an historic two-year journey across America, March 2016 - December 2017, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the apparitions at Fatima, visiting more than 100 dioceses in 50 states. The Diocese of Lake Charles is participating in the tour December 5-9, 2016.

Parishes hosting the tour include St. Theresa of the Child Jesus in Carlyss (Monday, Dec. 5), Our Lady of LaSalette in Sulphur (Tuesday, Dec. 6), Our Lady Queen of Heaven in Lake Charles (Wednesday, Dec. 7), The Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception (Thursday, Dec. 8), and Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Jennings (Friday, Dec. 9). Each parish is planning a special day to commemorate the Fatima celebrations, which may include processions, Mass, Rosary, confessions, talks on Fatima, and private veneration of the statue. The goal of the Fatima Centennial U.S. Tour for Peace is to allow Our Lady of Fatima to claim her dominion over America through her Immaculate Heart, and to bring the urgent Message of Fatima—the Peace Plan from Heaven—to a world in need. It also encourages devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, which was the mission given to Lucia, the seer at Fatima, by Our Lady and Our Lord. Jesus relayed to Sister Lucia in 1936 that he wished to establish devotion to the Immaculate Heart in the Church next to His Sacred Heart, and that He had placed the peace in the world in her Immaculate Heart.

The International Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Fatima was sculpted in 1947 by famous sculptor José Thedim, upon the precise instructions of Sister Lucia. On October 13, 1947, the statue was blessed by the Bishop of Fatima and commissioned to serve as the Pilgrim Virgin that would carry the blessings of Fatima throughout the world. The Bishop prayed that Mary herself accompany the statue wherever

Many graces and favors, including cures, and countless conversions have been associated with the precious image. The statue has traveled around the globe many times, visiting more than 100 countries, including Russia and China.

## Welsh named "Home of Cajun Dictionary"

WELSH – The Louisiana State Legislature has honored this Southwest Louisiana community with the honor of being named the "Home of the Cajun Dictionary," a tome self-published by the late Msgr. Jules O. Daigle, the pastor for 44 years of Our Lady of Seven Dolors Catholic Church.

Msgr. Daigle, who died at the age of 97 in 1998, published the dictionary in 1984 in his attempt, according to niece Connie Gremillion, "to preserve the Cajun language as he knew it and justify the reality of Cajun as a true language in its own right.

Friends and family along with a number of clergy attended Mass on Wednesday, Oct. 19, remembering Msgr. Daigle.

Following the presentation of the proclamation by State Representative Johnny Guinn, who sponsored the legislation in the Louisiana House, to family members and words of remembrance by Ms. Gremillion and his nephew Harold Schoefflerr of Lafayette, the Friends of the Welsh Museum hosted a reception in the museum.

Father Whitney Miller, the director of Saint Charles Center and a former pastor of Our Lady of Seven Dolors, was the homilist for the

"Words matter because words placed together in patterns and thought provoking sentences create languages and languages can unite or divide people, "Father Miller said. "Words matter. Fr. Jules Daigle knew this and was a man fond of words, especially Cajun words.'

In his references to Msgr. Daigle, Father Miller used the more familiar "Father" Daigle. Daigle was honored in 1952 with the title "mon-

"I one day referred to him as Monsignor Daigle and he

kindly asked me, 'Whitney, if you don't mind, please just call me Father Daigle because that's how the people of this town who I know so well and love so much, that's what they call me, so call me Father Daigle, okay?"

Father Miller also noted his dealings with Father Daigle as Pastor-emeritus following his retirement.

"As preparation for this brief reflection today, I thought about my years spent here at Our Lady of Seven Dolors and the connection I shared with him," Father Miller said. "I tried to think of the words I heard him speak to me, recall things he said, favorite sayings and as I did so, it became clear to me that the words I heard him say most often were 'Thank you.' He was a gracious and ever grateful man.'

He continued by speaking of the Cajun dictionary and the Cajun Self Taught textbook that came later.

"In his work on this Cajun Dictionary and the grammar text, which was to follow, he felt and found that the Cajun people were being distanced from their language and as this was happening they were losing a sense of identity who they were what united them and what brought them together in the first place. And so, he worked to restore this, in and through words, Cajun words - words which when joined together form a language but not only a language but shape the heart of a people."

Born and raised in Lafayette, Msgr. Daigle studied at St. Joseph Seminary in St. Benedict, La., St. Mary's in Baltimore, Maryland, and the North American College in Rome, where he was or-

dained in 1925. He served St. Michael Parish in Crowley and Immaculate Conception in Lake Charles before becoming pastor of Our Lady of Seven Dolors in 1930. After he retired in 1974, he launched the writing career that brought him international recognition for his work and was in demand for radio, television and newspaper interviews as an authority on Cajun language and heritage. At the time of his death in 1998, he was in the process of writing another book about the history of Cajun culture, but it was left unfinished.

## Catholic Charities continues providing aid to flood victims





**Catholic Charities of Southwest Louisiana continues** to work diligently to aid those who were affected by the flooding of August in South Louisiana. In addition, local and national agencies and organizations have stepped up to provide contributions of food, paper goods (including cleaning supplies, toilet paper, paper towels).
