



Couples honored for marriage jubilees

The annual event is sponsored by the Office of Family Life. Bishop Provost presented each couple with a special certificate honoring their long-time Christian commitment.

In his Trinity Sunday homily, Bishop Provost noted that, "The Catholic Church is perhaps one of the only institutions left in our society today that defends the beauty of married life. As Jesus tells us in the Gospel, it all begins with Adam and Eve. They are the summit of His Creation. They are made in His image."

Using the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the Bishop continued. "The vocation to marriage is written in the very nature of

man and woman as they came from the hand of the Creator. God who created man out of love also calls him to love—the fundamental and innate vocation of every human being. For man is created in the image and likeness of God who is himself love."

"We speak of the couple both complimenting one another and completing one another," the Bishop said, "This is especially true of Christian marriage. The Catholic Church teaches us that the union between husband and wife is like the union between Christ and His Church. God wills the Church into being for a purpose. Simply there is no Church without Christ, and God uses this mystical union between His Son and His Bride, the Church, to bring His salvation into the world. Christian married couples share in this work.

"Thank all of you who have so beautifully lived your marriage in fidelity and perseverance," he concluded. "May God continue to allow you, like a fine work of art, to reflect something of His beauty, truth and love to the world."

Quo Vadis Days draws 18 men

MOSS BLUFF – Eighteen men attended the recent Diocese of Lake Charles "Quo Vadis Days" Retreat held at Saint Charles Center and sponsored through the Office of Vocation.

"The three-day retreat helps young men discern the will of God in their life," Father Jeffrey Starkovich, director of vocations and seminarians said. "The group of young men from across the diocese attending this year, joined a number of priests and the seminarians to learn about seminary and the priesthood. Each day, there were conferences that explored a different aspect of priestly formation."

"Prayer, too, plays a central role," Father Starkovich continued. "Everyone gathered to pray the liturgy of the hours, a daily rosary, a holy

hour before the Blessed Sacrament, and daily Mass. In between the conferences and prayer times, there were also opportunities for recreation and fraternity."

Bishop Glen John Provost was the celebrant of the closing mass held in the Chapel of the Assumption of Tabor Retreat House.

"Everyone is called to holiness, and that vocation to holiness is lived out in the particular vocations of marriage, priesthood, or religious life," Father Starkovich said. "Throughout the retreat, the men are taught the best practices for discernment and are equipped to hear the voice of God calling them to pursue their vocation."

Two honored by Catholic Charities of SW Louisiana

LAKE CHARLES – Two individuals were honored at the 2017 Catholic Charities of Southwest Louisiana Jazz Brunch for their generous contributions of self and resources to aid those most in need in Southwest Louisiana.

This year's winner of the Caritas Award, given to someone in the community who exemplifies a life of selfless giving, was Esther Vincent while the Saint Peter Claver Award was presented to Reggy Saxon. This award is given to someone in the community who demonstrates particular concern for those in need.

Vincent has been a life-long advocate for the community of Southwest Louisiana, beginning her career as a teacher then as a counselor and a principal. Throughout her career in the public school system her motto was "Children are our first priority" and she was dedicated to the education and the wellbeing of her students.

Following retirement from the public school system after more than 30 years, she began a second career as Director of Community Development and Services with the City of Lake Charles and in her current position oversees a wide range of programs. She collaborates with other community organizations on many issues such as the needs of children in foster care, young adults aging out of foster care, assisting persons who have been released from prison to help them re-enter the community, affordable housing, and homeless prevention issues.

Then-Mayor Randy Roach hired her to direct the department due to her leadership skills, organizational skills, honesty, and the heart and compassion she has for everyone in our community. She has been a tireless advocate for homeless persons and low income families in our community when it comes to providing affordable quality housing. She has the strength, courage, and faith to deal with all types of problems and situations while always being just and compassionate to the public that she serves.

A life-long member of Reeves Temple Christian Methodist Episcopal Church and currently its Treasurer and Choir Director, her faith has given her the insight, desire, and ability to help the community and families in our neighborhoods. As a leader, Esther Vincent always advocates collaboration, creativity, hard work, and vision in order to solve our problems and make Southwest Louisiana a great place for all who live here.

Saxon worked 19 years as a machinist before transitioning to the engineering field in 1988. In 1995, Saxon with two others founded ReCon Management Services, Inc., focusing on the proper placement of professional personnel to support the project needs of the local industries.

Since his retirement from the business, his life is devoted to service work and spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior to the community and everyone he meets. He has been an active supporter of the pro-life movement and board member and officer of New Life Counseling. He is a member of the Southern Baptist Disaster Relief team and he is a Deacon and active member of Trinity Baptist Church. He travels around the United States and Canada to assist communities ravaged by disasters and to help assist new churches with building projects.

With the Sabine River flooding of 2016, Saxon has worked tirelessly with Southern Baptist Disaster Relief Team to oversee the relief efforts in Vinton, Starks, and surrounding areas. He has also assisted with the flooding in Baton Rouge, Welsh, and Jennings.

He is currently with Catholic Charities as the Volunteer Project Manager for Disaster Restoration Program. He has worked diligently to help restore the homes and spirits of the families that were devastated by the flooding.

Sr. Mary Vianney Walsh, RSM, director of Catholic Charities, presented her annual report. Catholic Charities Services and Assistance provided in 2016 included: Rent/Mortgage Assistance/Homelessness Prevention Program \$144,143;

Utility Assistance \$38,974; Funeral Assistance \$8,200; "Beat the Heat" A/C Program \$21,620; Prescription Assistance \$11,021; Adopt a Senior/Headstart Child Christmas Project \$18,000; Transportation Assistance \$2,329; Employment/ID Assistance \$5,955; Food Assistance \$224,635; and the Debbie Warshaw Fund Assistance \$2,530. More than 3,484 persons were assisted and a total of \$477,407 was given in assistance.

Disaster Assistance was given for those in need during and after the March and August 2016 floods. An estimated 3600 persons were assisted and a total of \$300,000 has been given in assistance. Catholic Charities continues to help the victims of the flooding to recover through its Long Term Disaster Recovery Program.


Father Egidio Vecchio laid to rest

SULPHUR – Father Egidio A. Vecchio, M.S., 90, a member of the Missionaries of Our Lady of LaSalette, died May 25, 2017, at St. Dominic Village Nursing Home in Houston.

He was born March 13,

1927, in Syracuse, N.Y., son of the late Anthony and Angela (Pugliesi) Vecchio. After attending grammar and junior high school in Gloversville, N.Y., he completed high school at the LaSalette Seminary in Hartford, Conn. He entered the LaSalette Novitiate on July 1, 1947, in Bloomfield, Conn., and made his first vows on July 2, 1948. He then completed his studies in philosophy and theology at the LaSalette Seminary in Ipswich, Mass. Father Vecchio was ordained to the priesthood on June 4, 1955 at St. Catherine of Siena Church in Norwood, Mass.
