Holy Week in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception

On Palm Sunday, (1) Bishop Glen John Provost began the liturgy in prayer in the Cathedral's courtyard where he blessed the palms to be given out to the faithful, blessed Deacon Sam Orsot before the Deacon's reading of the Gospel (2) prior to the procession of the faithful into the Cathedral for Mass. On Wednesday of Holy Week, Bishop Provost celebrated the Chrism Mass in con-celebration with the priests (3) of the Diocese of Lake Charles in the Cathedral. In (4) Bishop completes the final blessing of the Mass before moving to competing the blessing and consecration of the Sacred Oils - the Oil of the Sick, Holy Chrism, and the Oil of Catechumens. It will be from these reserves, that the priests are provided a sufficient amount of the oils to be used to administer the sacraments in their parishes during the year. In (5) Bishop Provost pours balsam (a scented oil) into the container of olive oil. After the two are stirred together, the Bishop then breathes (6) over the vessel of chrism, a gesture which symbolizes both the Holy Spirit coming down to consecrate this oil, and the life-giving, sanctifying nature of the sacraments for which it is used. In photo (7) both the Bishop and the priests concelebrating the mass place their hands over the oils. On Holy Thursday, the Mass of the Lord's Supper begins with the tabernacle (8) open and empty of the Blessed Sacrament. Holy Thursday is the commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, when he established the sacrament of Holy Communion prior to his arrest and crucifixion. It also commemorates His institution of the priesthood and the day when the priests renew their vows. Bishop Provost incenses the altar (9) at the beginning of the liturgy. It is also at this liturgy when the washing of the feet of Cathedral parishioners takes place, in commemoration of the washing of the Apostles feet by Jesus at the Last Supper. At the close of Mass, the Cathedral choir chants (10) near the front doors of the church, as Bishop Provost carries (11) the Blessed Sacrament out of the Cathedral to its place of repose until where a prayerful watch by the faithful is continued throughout the remainder of the evening (12). After entering the Cathedral silently on Good Friday afternoon, the Bishop prays the opening prayer while the servers, including seminarians of the diocese, prostrate themselves before the bare altar. The large wooden cross is brought to the altar the Cathedral (13).

stopping three times to be incensed and for recited prayers (Behold the wood of the cross on which hung the salvation of the world and the response Come, let us adore). Bishop Provost (14) kneels and venerates the cross by kissing it, which is followed with veneration by the people (15). The Easter Vigil begins after sunset, the start of the new liturgical day, with the Service of Light (16) with the faithful congregating outside the church. It is here (17) that the Bishop blesses and prepares the Paschal candle, the first candle to be lit with a flame from this sacred fire, representing the light of Christ coming into the world. This represents the risen Christ, as a symbol of light (life) dispelling darkness (death). The Bishop processes into the church in near-darkness, with only the Paschal candle for light. Smaller are candles are lit (18) from it to quell the darkness. Following the homily, Bishop Provost blesses the water that will be used to initiate those received into the Church and then performs the Rite of Baptism on (19) the Elect, pronouncing the words, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Following the Baptism, the Bishop sprinkles water on the congregation (20). The newly baptized is also confirmed and in (21), the Bishop lays hands on the Confirmed.
