



St. Maximilian Kolbe Prison Ministry comes to Diocese

OBERLIN – An effort that began more than two years ago – an effort to bring the Saint Maximilian Kolbe Prison Ministry to the Diocese of Lake Charles, bore fruit recently with the first retreat for 65 men incarcerated at the Allen Parish Correctional Center.

Fifty-five volunteers, from church parishes in the Diocese of Lake Charles and the Diocese of Beaumont, staffed the retreat, which was “well received” according to Shelley Hacker, founding director of the Kolbe Prison Ministry in the diocese and a parishioner of Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church.

Monsignor Daniel Torres, pastor of Our Lady Queen of Heaven, served as the Spiritual Director of the retreat at Allen Correctional, which came there “with the blessing of our Bishop, The Most Reverend Glen John Provost,” Msgr. Torres noted.

“I watched the prisoners come in on Thursday with a coldness and stoic expression in their demeanor,” Msgr. Torres said. “On Sunday, there existed joy, hope, peace, and love. A visible transformation was evident in the lives of these prisoners who were murderers, rapists, thieves, sexual and domestic abuse offenders.

“They felt the Love of God penetrating their hardened hearts and experienced hope, peace, love, joy, and the tools on how to grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ,” he continued. “They learned the importance of how to discern God’s Will versus the will of society. They understood they have to be men owning up to their choices and consequences. It was a beautiful retreat for my soul as well

as everyone present.”

The gymnasium of the prison had been transformed into a makeshift retreat center for Mass, prayer, testimonies, adoration, and sharing meals, according to Msgr. Torres.

“The organization and execution of the four days was unbelievable,” he said. “Shelley brought a genuine, humbling, hard-working spirit to help the prisoners to see they are loved by God. The many volunteers worked well with the leadership of Shelley and others.”

The ministry came to Southwest Louisiana via the Diocese of Beaumont through personal relationships between men involved in various church ministries, including the ACTS Ministry.

“It came to Beaumont from St. Mary’s Catholic Church in Fredericksburg, Texas,” Hacker said.

According to the website – kolbeprisonministries.com – the ministry came about following numerous KAIROS weekends (an interdenominational Christian ministry whose programs are designed to be presented in correctional institutions). From interaction between an offender in the Texas prison, a volunteer, and the prison chaplain, ACTS Prison retreats began and were soon approved to be brought into any unit within the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) who may wish to have the retreat in their unit.

“The focus is prisons,” Hacker said. “We have prisons in Oakdale (a federal facility) and in Oberlin, as well as the Calcasieu Parish Jail. We hope to expand into that facility



and overall do two or three retreats a year and continue to expand, hopefully going statewide.

“That, though, will have to be a missioning effort among the bishops of the state and volunteers in each diocese who would like to take it up,” Hacker noted. “We have already been invited back to Allen Correctional for a second retreat.”

Hacker spoke of the men who worked dili-

gently with him over the past two years to make that first retreat possible - David Hennigan, Bernard Marcantel, Estel Matt, Joe Hacker, Gerald Fruge, Randy Daigle, David Rogers, Jason Touchet, Cecil Ashford, Bill Bourgeois, and Dewey Duhon. “They prayed and sacrificed their time to travel to Beaumont for St. Kolbe ministry. Their efforts blossomed at Allen Correctional.”

March for Life Pilgrimage

LAKE CHARLES – The Office of Youth Ministry of the Diocese of Lake Charles is sponsoring a six-day Pilgrimage to Washington, DC – January 14 to January 19 – for high school teens and young adults attending the annual March for Life.

Three busloads of Southwest Louisiana pilgrims, including adult chaperones, will join hundreds of thousands of other pro-life supporters to mark the anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court decisions, including *Roe v Wade*, that legalized abortion.

Over the course of the trip, pilgrims will visit a few National Shrines, attend daily Mass including a Mass with Bishop Glen John Provost, pray in Adoration for the right to life, visit and pray at the Holocaust Museum, attend a national rally with

thousands of others. They will also participate in a prayer walk in front of the White House and Supreme Court, attend a Geaux Forth Rally with other teens from the State of Louisiana, visit national monuments and museums and most importantly join the thousands in solidarity to Pray and March for Life in front of our nation’s capital.

The cost of the pilgrimage is \$625, which includes travel, lodging, most meals, scarf, hat, bag, journal and entry fees into various events and sites.

A non-refundable deposit of \$200 is due with the registration form, which can be completed online or in paper form for each person making the pilgrimage. Paying the deposit or the entire cost can be done safely using a credit card or an e-check online at

lcdioocese.org by clicking the Event Registration logo.

Any payment balance for the pilgrimage must be paid by Monday, December 17. There will be an informational meeting that day beginning at 6 p.m. in the Diocesan Chancery Administration Building, 414 Iris Street.

Spaces for the pilgrimage are reserved on a first come, first serve basis. A spot will not be held without the non-refundable deposit and registration forms turned in to the Office of Youth Ministry, 411 Iris Street. Those considering taking part in this faith-filled journey should act quickly to reserve a seat.

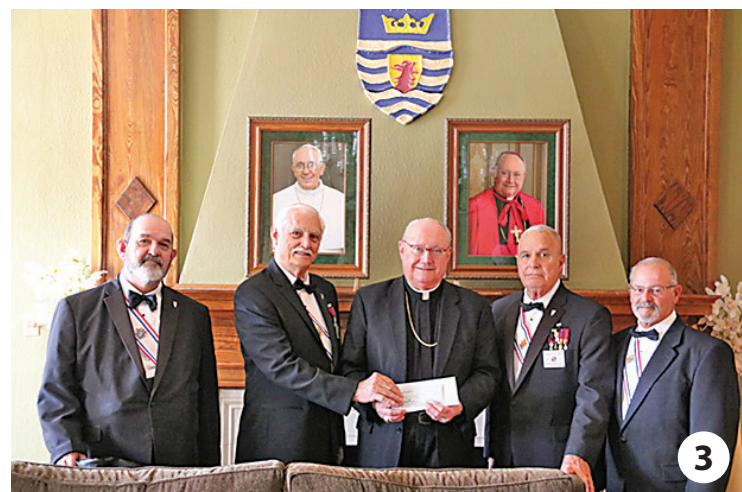

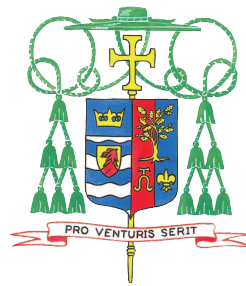

RETURN TO THE LORD

Priest Retirement Fund

LAKE CHARLES – One of the major goals in the Return to the Lord Capital Campaign of the Diocese of Lake Charles was to enhance the Priest Retirement Fund.

These monies are invested and only the interest earned from that investment goes to assist retired priests, of which there are currently 13, with pensions and health insurance coverage.

All of these men are priests who have been incardinated into the diocese and, thus, are the responsibility of the diocese.

The goal set for adding to the funding of the Priest Retirement Fund, which had nearly \$1.5 million at the start of the Capital Campaign, was \$3.2 million.

Currently, generous donors from throughout the Diocese of Lake Charles have pledged \$1,533,996.23 with payments totaling \$863,337.96.

Providing a dignified retirement for these men that have spent their lives in service to God in this local church is of utmost importance. Increasing this fund is significant because our priests are living longer and, just as for the laity, their healthcare costs continue to increase.

Not that far into the future, there will be additional priests who will retire. In the next eight years, perhaps as many as 12, and that does not take into account those who may become too

ill to perform their pastoral duties during that time.

Bishop Glen John Provost ordained a single priest in 2018 and, with the Grace of God, will ordain another in 2019. Four men studying in Rome and at Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans are scheduled to be ordained transitional deacons next year and then to the priesthood for the Diocese

in 2020, the largest class of men to be ordained priests for the Diocese in its history.

Currently, retired priests will have paid into Social Security, receiving a monthly check the Social Security Administration and being eligible to receive benefits from Medicare. Those diocesan priests serving now also pay into that system. Religious order priests serving

in Southwest Louisiana are the responsibility of their religious orders.

Many of the retired priests continue to perform significant service to various churches of the local church, such as filling in for masses when a priest is on vacation or has to be out of the parish on retreat or educational reasons.

Deacon Kohlhund was ordained a permanent deacon on June 24, 1977 in Our Lady of Prompt Succor Catholic Church by The Most Reverend Gerard L. Frey, Bishop of

Lafayette, and served at St. Joseph until his retirement. He was incardinated into the Diocese of Lake Charles following its establishment in 1980.

He was born in Audubon, New Jersey on Nov. 3, 1927 and received his B.S. in Engineering from Texas A&M College in 1954.

Deacon Kohlhund, who served in the United States Navy from 1946-1950 and the United States Naval Reserve

until his honorable discharge in 1971, is survived by his wife Evelyn and five daughters – Karen Dianne, Candice Lynn, Kathy Lee, Elizabeth Anne and Mary Evelyn.
