Father Michael Caraway, four deacons ordained





Bishop Glen John Provost was the presiding prelate on Saturday, June 29, for the Mass of Ordination for a new priest for the Diocese of Lake Charles – Rev. Michael Caraway and four transitional deacons (the largest number of transitional deacons ever ordained for the diocese)
Deacon Sam Bond, Deacon Joseph Caraway, Deacon Andrew DeRouen, and Deacon Levi Thompson – in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. At the conclusion of the liturgy, before the final blessing by Bishop Provost, Deacon George Stearns, diocesan chancellor, pronounced the pastoral changes for a number of diocesan parishes, including the first priestly assignment for Father Caraway as Parochial Vicar to Our Lady of Prompt Succor Catholic Church in Sulphur. Additionally, the summer pastoral assignments for the four deacons was announced – Deacon Bond is attending the Liturgical Institute of Chicago; Deacon DeRouen is serving at Our Lady of Prompt Succor Catholic Church in Sulphur; Deacon Joseph Caraway at St. Henry Catholic Church in Lake Charles; and Deacon Thompson at Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church in Lake Charles Father Caraway celebrated a Mass of Thanksgiving on Sunday, June 30, at his home parish of Our Lady Help of Christians Catholic Church in Jennings. Deacon Joseph Caraway, Father Ćaraway's cousin, was the homilist for the liturgy. An essential act of ordination, this liturgical gesture is handed down from the Apostles and signifies the conferral of the Holy Spirit. Many and varied activities occurred in the life of the local church of the Diocese of Lake Charles in recent months. Above, in pictures, are some of them. In photo 1, Bishop Glen John Provost meets with members of the special needs community and their families following the celebration of Mass - which was offered as an opportunity for all to worship despite difficulty, frustration and without embarrassment - in the Commons of St. Louis Catholic High School. The 48th Biennial Louisiana State Convention for the Catholic Daughters of the Americas was held in Sulphur in April. In photo 2, Bishop Provost and Bishop Douglas Deshotel, Bishop of Lafayette, process into Our Lady of Prompt Succor Catholic Church in Sulphur for the Opening Mass of the convention on Friday, March 29. Holy Week began on Palm Sunday at St. Margaret of Scotland Catholic Church with the blessing of palms by Bishop Provost, as seen in photo 3. On Wednesday, April 17, Bishop Provost celebrated the Chrism Mass, which was concelebrated by the priests of the diocese. Bishop Provost, after pouring balsam (a scented oil) into the container of olive oil and stirring them together, breathes into the vessel of chrism, a gesture which symbolizes both the Holy Spirit coming down to consecrate the oil and the life-giving sanctifying nature of the sacraments for which it is used during the year. On Holy Thursday, at the conclusion of the liturgy in photo 5, Bishop Provost carries the Blessed Sacrament from St. Margaret in procession to the church's day chapel where a prayerful watch is continued throughout the remainder of the evening. On Good Friday, the only day of the year when Mass is not celebrated, a large wooden cross is brought to the altar, stopping three times on its journey down the center aisle to be incensed and for recited prayers in photo 6 by Father Samuel Orsot (Behold the wood of the cross on which hung the salvation of the world and the response Come, let us adore). Bishop Provost venerated the cross by kissing it, which is followed with its veneration by the people. The Easter Vigil began after sunset, the start of the new liturgical day, with the Service of Light outside the church. Following the homily, Bishop Provost blessed the water to be used to initiate those received into the Church. In photo 7, the Bishop performs the Rite of Baptism of one of the Elect, pronouncing the words, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." In photo 9, at The Ruth Institute's Annual Awards Dinner, which preceded the Survivors Summit, awardees for the 2018-2019 academic year stand with Founder and President Dr. Jennifer Roback Morse, second from left, Dr. Robert Cagnon, Scholarship Award; Moira Greyland Peat, Public Witness of the Year; and Jeff Morgan, Activist of the Year. Children from Catholic schools collected funds from their peers on "jeans day," totaling \$1,661.55, and presented a check to Sr. Miriam MacLean, RSM, photo 9, for use by Catholic Charities of Southwest Louisiana. Students represented are Emma Findley, Our Lady's School; Ana Poncho, Immaculate Conception Cathedral School; Elena Guidry, Our Lady Queen of Heaven; Andrew Castle, St. Louis Catholic High School; and Bayleigh Vincent, St. Margaret of Scotland Catholic School. Bishop Provost prayed the Invocation at the Memorial Day Avenue of Flags Ceremonies in Orange Grove-Graceland Cemetery. The 12th Annual National Maritime Day Memorial Service and Celebration, photo 11, had Deacon Patrick Lapoint, director of the Lake Charles Seafarers Center, blessing the boats that passed along the seawall of the Lake Charles Civic Center. The 2019 Convocation of priests of the Diocese was held at Tabor Retreat House of Saint Charles Center in Moss Bluff.
