Papal honors given to faithful servants of Diocese of LC

LAKE CHARLES — Honors conferred by the Holy Father, Pope Francis, were publicly received by 17 laity of the Diocese of Lake Charles in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception on Sunday, February 13.

His Excellency, The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, D.D., M.A., officiated the Solemn Vespers for the Conferral of Papal Honors at 6:00 p.m. He was assisted by the Very Reverend Ruben J. Buller, Vicar General; Reverend Samuel Bond, Master of Ceremonies; Deacon George Stearns, Chancellor; and Deacon Brian Soileau, Secretary for the Ministry of Christian

Six were named Knight in the Order of Saint Gregory the Great; two received the Papal Cross Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice (Cross for the Church and Pontiff); and nine received the Papal Medal Benemerenti (Well-Deserving).

Pope Francis conferred the honors at the request of Bishop Provost.

"We are gathered in our Cathedral today to confer Papal honors upon distinguished men and women of our diocese," Bishop Provost said. "We could have honored others as well, but to paraphrase the words of St. Paul, when one is honored, all share in the joy (cf. I Corinthians 12:26). This is how the Church

"Our celebration springs not from their desire but from ours, for we, like St. Paul, must thank God for the Christian service and example made visible in the lives of these faithful Catholic Christians," the bishop continued.

Bishop Provost reminded the honorees to never take for granted any act of goodness on their part.

"We indeed learn from the wise, and when that teacher's wisdom comes from a humble heart and mind, the lesson is even more valuable," he said.

"It is this dedication to the message of Christ and His Church that we celebrate today. Our thanksgiving is for the goodness that has shown forth in the lives of these humble men and women. They have given of themselves to the vulnerable, the helpless, and the young.

"They have built up the Body of Christ by promoting family values and solid Christian teachings. They have not compromised with the world but rather strived to convert the world, slowly and surely, one humble act at a time. They are the 'firstfruits,' sanctified by the Spirit and truth."

When the Papal honors were first announced in December of 2021, Bishop Provost congratulated the recipients for being

Diocese in compliance with Charter

on results of the 2021 onsite audit of the Diocese of Lake Charles, the Diocese has been found compliant with all audited Articles within the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People for the audit period of July 1, 2018 through September 30,

Bishop Glen John Provost was informed of the finding in a letter, dated January 5, 2022, from Stonebridge Business Partners, which is the company that conducts independent audits of dioceses across the country. The letter thanked the Diocese for its cooperation during the process.

According to the correspondence, "the conclusions reached as to the compliance of the diocese are based upon inquiry, observation and the review of specifically requested documentation furnished to StoneBridge Business Partners during the course of the audit."

The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People is a comprehensive set of procedures originally established by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in June 2002 for addressing allegations of sexual abuse of minors by Catholic clergy. The Charter also includes guidelines for reconciliation, healing, accountability, and prevention of future acts of abuse. It was revised in 2005, 2011, and 2018.

Stone Bridge thanked the Diocese for its efforts to protect the children and young people in the Diocese of Lake Charles. The next onsite audit is scheduled in 2024.

Diocese seeks input for upcoming Synod

The Office of the Vicar General for Pastoral Services for the Diocese of Lake Charles is seeking assistance from the faithful to prepare a document regarding the upcoming Synod on Synodality.

The document will be sent to the Vatican for review in August of this year.

Pope Francis invites the entire Church to reflect on the theme: "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission.

Monsignor Daniel A. Torres, V.G., was appointed by Bishop Glen John Provost to chair the work in the Diocese regarding the Synod. The Holy Father has called for each

diocese to participate. In this regard, Monsignor Torres has requested that each organization, ministry, and entity of the parish/religious order/school have discussions of the history, present realities, and future dreams of the Catholic Church that people may share.

A gathering of no more than 10 representatives from each parish will be held on Saturday, March 26, at Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church beginning at 8:00 a.m. with Mass, followed by a diocesan-wide discussion from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Family Life Center gym. The representatives can hear, vision, and offer the hopes and dreams for the diocese.

NATIONAL CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK MASS Students reminded of humility, saying 'yes' to God's will

LAKE CHARLES — Seniors at St. Louis Catholic High School were reminded of the importance of humility and always being open to God's will for each of them as they gathered for the annual Catholic Schools Week Mass on Feb. 2.

In celebration of National Catholic Schools Week — held Jan. 30-Feb. 5 — the Very Reverend Ruben J. Buller, Vicar General, officiated the special Mass in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, followed by a talk by Rev. Michael Caraway, Director of Vocations for the Diocese of

Father Buller was also assisted by Rev. Nathan Long, pastor of St. Margaret of Scotland Catholic Church and rector of St. Louis High; and Rev. Levi Thompson, parochial vicar of Our Lady Queen of Heaven Catholic Church.

The Mass coincided with the Feast Day of the Presentation of the Lord, "a remarkable feast when we recall the story of when the Blessed Mother Mary and St. Joseph bring Jesus to the Temple to present him to the Lord out of obedience and humility," said Father Buller.

"It is this humility," he said, "that allows us to say what it is that we have, but more importantly to say what we don't have.

"Humility is one of the greatest virtues that we can strive for. This is crucial for you, as students, to admit that you don't know something. It is also crucial for each one of us in the Christian life to admit that we don't have everything, and we must rely on God," Father Buller continued.

"We don't come into the world knowing everything. It takes humility on our part to say I do not have all the answers, Lord. I need you to teach me through my teachers, through the school that I attend, through my prayers and my understanding how I need God's grace.

"It is only through humility, this striving always to say what we do not have, realizing that our Lord will fulfill what we need," Buller emphasized.

Following the Mass, Father Caraway talked to the students about the importance of discerning their vocation in life, whether that be a calling to the priesthood, religious life, marriage, or single life. He explained that a vocation is a calling.

"Our hearts were made for a particular way of loving, and that is our vocational calling, the way in which our Lord is calling us to love like Christ in the world," said Father Caraway.

'There is nothing greater than saying 'yes' to

God's will in your life. There is nothing more awesome than living your vocation well," he Father Caraway, who was ordained a priest in 2019, shared his conversion story with the

students. It was not that many years ago when he was a quarterback on his high school football team and dating. "During my own vocation journey, I came to the humbling realization that I had never asked God what He wanted me to do with my life," he recalled. "I began asking God, 'Your will be done,

Father Caraway explained that when people do what the Lord has made them for, that will bring the greatest fulfillment within their hearts.

The students were selected for the honor based on grade point average, school organization participation, community service, an essay writing assignment, and an interview with a panel of judges.

2022 Lenten Regulations

Every Catholic, to enter more deeply into the life of Christ, is to participate in some way in the spiritual and penitential disciplines of Lent. The regulations for the Catholic Church in the United States are as follows: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.

The obligation to abstain from meat binds Catholics 14 years of age and older. The obligation to fast, limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals during the day, binds Catholics from the age of 18 to 59. Those younger or older are encouraged to voluntarily embrace these disciplines in so far as they are able.

Divine and Natural Law holds that all the faithful are morally bound to do penance.

The Fourth Precept of the Church obliges Catholics to observe the penance of fasting and abstinence for Lent.

Fridays outside of Lent are also days of penance and spiritual discipline. Abstaining from meat is the traditional way of observing these days of penance. The Bishops of the United States have granted permission for abstinence from meat on Fridays outside of Lent to be replaced with some other self-denial or personal penance. However, Friday remains a day of some penitential practice. As Bishop Provost has stated in pastoral letters: "The idea of sacrificing something is countercultural to the 'throwaway' mentality that plagues us today and of which Pope Francis has time and again warned us" (September 3, 2015).

Fasting should never endanger one's health. Avoiding some form of permissible entertainment or performing sacrificial acts of charity, for example, could replace the fasting when health is a consideration.

Finally, with any penitential discipline, both the letter and the spirit are to be maintained. For example, replacing meat with a gourmet seafood meal is not in keeping with penitential practice. Also, the increasingly popular practice of hosting "crawfish boils" and entertainments on Good Friday is highly inappropriate. Good Friday remains an extraordinary and solemn day on which we recall the suffering and death of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Good Friday should remain a day of fasting, abstinence, prayer, penance, and interior and exterior quiet.
