# Stella Maris Seafarers Center to celebrate 60 years

LAKE CHARLES - More than 60 years ago, a priest saw a need to minister to people of the sea visiting the Port of Lake Charles. It was that love to care for those far from home that led to what is known today as the Stella Maris Seafarers Center in the Diocese of Lake Charles.

The Seafarers Center will celebrate its 60th Anniversary with a Mass of Celebration at 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, April 19, in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, 935 Bilbo Street. Bishop Glen John Provost will officiate.

"The ministry started with Father Theodore Hassink as the first port chaplain in 1956 who ministered from his car and home until the Center was established in 1962," said Deacon Patrick Lapoint, Sr., serving in his 21st year as director. Father Hassink, who was a priest in the Diocese of Lafayette serving in Lake Charles, carried out his role until 1970.

The Seafarers Center is part of the worldwide organization Stella Maris, formerly known as Apostleship of the Sea. The Vatican announced the name change on the occasion of the 100th Anniversary of the apostolate that was established in Glasgow, Scotland in October 1920.

Directors in the Diocese of Lake Charles over the past 60 years include: 1962-1978 Herman C. Verkruissen; 1978-1987 — William "Bill" A. Leonard; 1987-1990 — Robert Casey; 1990-1999 Patrick Broussard; 1999-2001 - Archie Thomas; and 2001-present: — Patrick A. Lapoint, Sr.

"Our mission is to welcome all seafarers to Lake Charles; the Church going to them," Deacon Lapoint explained about the port ministry that also serves the Calcasieu Ship Channel area. Stella Maris, through the

chaplain, represents the local bishop and serves as the mariners' minister and friend. Many are away from home at least six months at a time. In addition to meeting

spiritual needs of the ship crew - such as Mass, Confession, Anointing of the Sick, and even Funeral Rites — the Seafarers Center also works to provide counseling, medical assistance, ensure a safe work environment, just contracts, and communication with loved ones.

Deacon Lapoint recalled an incident that occurred within two months of his being hired as director that still sticks in his mind nearly 21 years later.

"I had driven two Filipinos to go shopping, and when I arrived to pick them up, I learned that one of the sailors had suffered a brain aneurism and was taken to the hospital. He died later the same night," Lapoint said.

"What complicated matters is that the death happened at the beginning of September 2001, and the September 11 terror attacks happened less than two weeks later," he continued. "The body could not be returned to the family until the end of October. I stayed in touch with the family for a year making sure they received all their insurance money."

In most recent weeks, Deacon Lapoint, along with Associate Director Fontenot, has been visiting ships with Ukrainians and Russians. When their contracts end, they must figure out how they are getting home because of the difficulties amid the war in Ukraine.

"The sailors are worried about their families, and there is nothing they can do. We just listen to them with compassion," Lapoint said.

#### Port Chaplain

In his role as port chaplain, Father Rommel Tolentino is reminded often of what it is like to be far from his homeland in the Philippines. Ministering to people of the sea is an opportunity to offer hope and "The Catholic Church is

bigger than just my parish or our local diocese. The ministry of the Seafarers Center is to reassure those at sea that they are not forgotten by the Universal Church," said Father Tolentino.

"Whenever I get requests to celebrate Mass on the ships, I know the sailors are always very appreciative. Nourishing their faith is so important because the strength of their faith in God can help them deal better with the many challenges and disappointments they face," he continued.

Since many seafarers are Filipinos, Father Tolentino said he always makes it a point to sing Filipino hymns during Mass. "It makes them feel close to home," he said.

### Star of the Sea

Stella Maris is Latin for Star of the Sea, a title often given to the Virgin Mary under the title Our Lady. Deacon Lapoint credits the Blessed Virgin for guiding him to the Seafarers Center 25 years ago.

"Making rosaries is what led me to the Center and eventually as director. A friend of mine and I belonged to Our Lady's Rosary Makers. A list was published every quarter of who needed rosaries and where to send them," Lapoint recalled. 'When the Seafarers Center in

Lake Charles was listed in 1997, I brought the rosaries to the Center myself."

Looking back, he can see God's hand at work.

"I was making rosaries to share with people around the world and was led here through a request in a newsletter. That was God opening a door to get me here," said Lapoint. "Once I saw what the ministry was about, it inspired me to start volunteering. It instilled a love for people from around the world who are at sea."

#### **Joyful Celebrations**

The centennial of the Apostleship of the Sea was one of many highlights over the years for the Seafarers Center.

On October 3, 2020, Bishop Provost celebrated Mass in the Cathedral, followed by a Marian and Eucharistic Procession to the Civic Center seawall and back to the Cathedral.

The event was quite an accomplishment considering Southwest Louisiana was picking up the pieces from Hurricane Laura that struck just five weeks earlier and Hurricane Delta that would make landfall in the same area six days later.

The Center also helped organize a tri-parish celebration in November of

"The Cathedral celebrated 150 years, while Sacred Heart of Jesus in Lake Charles and Our Lady of Prompt Succor in Sulphur were both marking 100 years. We had a beautiful boat procession around the Lake and called it a Fete-Dieu," said Tolentino.

#### **Community Support** The

community incredibly supportive of the Seafarers Center, especially at Christmastime, Lapoint noted. "Year round we collect

prayer cards, rosaries, and medals to give to everyone on the ships. During the holiday season, we collect cards, pens, envelopes, socks, wool caps, toiletries and washcloths," he said, noting that enough items are usually collected to make up 900 gift ditty bags. "The most we ever distributed one year was 1,200 bags."

The donations usually come from area churches and organizations, but in 2021, Westlake Chemical sponsored a drive, marking the first time a local industry contributed to the Christmas project. Volunteers help with the packing and wrapping.

"Our goal is to make sure we visit every ship at Christmastime, many years as much as 50 ships. It helps to make the holidays special for those who are so far from home. Of all the compliments we get from the sailors, the biggest one is that the people in Lake Charles are so friendly," Lapoint continued.

"This is a ministry, not a job. God is so good to us that he allows the Diocese to pay us so we can continue to do our

work through this ministry of hospitality."

# Couples learn ways to grow in holiness

MOSS BLUFF — Blake and Kelli Brignac will be the first to admit that life moves fast when you are raising three young children while juggling busy careers. That is one reason the couple, who will be married nine years in May, signed up for "Together in Holiness" held at Camp Karol on March 5.

They joined 46 other couples for the one-day marriage enrichment conference presented by the St. John Paul II Foundation and the Diocese of Lake Charles. Couples ranged from newly married to nearly 50 years.

The second annual event featured a mix of guest speakers with a focus on the theme, "Family as Community Prayer." Mass was celebrated by Bishop Glen John Provost, and time was set aside for Eucharistic Adoration, confession, and private time for the couples.

Kelli learned about the conference through St. Martin de Porres Catholic Church where she and Blake are parishioners.

"I was familiar with the St. John Paul II Foundation, but I had not heard of Together in Holiness," Kelli said. "What interested me was how it is meant for people who are in the throes of a busy life. My husband's business has been growing a lot, and I just had a major career change. I wanted time for us to be able to talk without all the daily distractions."

Blake said the day was a good reset for them to focus on their faith regarding each other and their three children.

"As time evolved, we got away from the path we discussed early on when we were planning to have a family. This time together gave us a chance to think about things and what we can do to get back on track," said Blake.

Together in Holiness is a marriage conference and formation series inspiring spouses to grow together in holiness and empowering parents to form their children in the Catholic faith. Bishop Provost emphasized that the couples should never underestimate what they do as a parent or as husband and wife.

"God wants us to cooperate with him in a complementary work where we are jointly engaged in something particularly important. Married couples perform a great service to God in what they do, and they contribute a great deal," Bishop Provost

said during his homily.

"You can have an argument or disagreement, which in modern society can be misinterpreted as the end of the world. It is not the end of the world if you have your relationship anchored in the Faith, which is God present in your midst. It is the way a married couple is to live the Sacrament of Matrimony," he continued.

Randall and Melissa Edwards, who have been married two years and are expecting their second child, attended so they could grow together in their young marriage.

"We pray daily as a family, but sometimes it is hard with a baby," said Melissa regarding their 1 1/2-year old. "It was nice to hear that we should do what we can and just keep trying."

The presentation on liturgical living resonated with Randall, who serves as Campus Minister for Cowboy Catholics at Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church. "I liked hearing ways to make the family dynamic holier

and incorporate good practices of sacrifice in our children, even while they are so young, to be able to grow with that," said Derrell and Jill Feverjean, parishioners of St. Theodore

Catholic Church, were glad to learn about things they can add in their marriage more than just going to Mass on Sundays.

"I was attracted to the spiritual component of the conference and how we can incorporate things with our 6-year-old and in our marriage," said Jill. "I enjoyed listening to the speakers and then having time for spouses to have one-on-one time throughout the day."

Roland Millare, STD, Vice President of Curriculum and Director of Shepherd's Heart, said the goal of Together in Holiness is to help couples not just survive but to thrive in their marriages. Millare presented a talk, "The Holy Eucharist, A Nuptial Sacrament."

'We want couples to realize that marriage vocation is a means by which they can answer the call to holiness," he said.

"The day offers time with the Lord and time with your spouse. For married couples, a day-long commitment is much easier to make than a whole weekend."

Returning participants Wayne and Amanda Jeffries are encouraged by so many other couples trying to live a life of holiness. They know all too well the importance of making time for each other. Now parishioners of Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church, their marriage is the second for both.

"We already have commitments that we try to live out in our daily lives being part of the Domestic Church. Coming here helps to reignite that spark and recenter us on God's will for us in our marriage and God's will for us as parents, and helps us to prioritize," said Amanda. "It is a wonderful opportunity to be around other like-minded couples and to be reminded that we are not alone in this journey toward Heaven."

In addition to Millare, other topics and speakers included "Liturgical Living in the Home" by Michael and Erin Fontenot, of Our Lady Help of Christians Catholic Church in Jennings; and Sister Mary Benedicta Maier, R.S.M., co-director of the Offices of Marriage, Family Life, and Pro-Life Ministries for the Diocese of Lake Charles; and "The Eucharistic Mission of the Family" by Damon Owens, founder of Joyful Ever After.

# Bishop Provost to preside at Sacred Triduum in Cathedral

LAKE CHARLES - The Most Reverend Glen John Provost will celebrate the Sacred Triduum - Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil - in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, 935 Bilbo Street. On Palm Sunday, April 10, Bishop Provost will bless the palms before the 9:30 a.m. Mass in the Cathedral. Palms will also be blessed at the 4 p.m. Extraordinary Form Mass that

The Bishop will be the celebrant of the Chrism Mass in the Cathedral at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, April 13, with the priests of the Diocese as concelebrants. At this Mass, the Holy Oils - Oil of the Sick, Oil of Catechumens, and the Oil of Chrism – used during the year are prepared and blessed.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper is celebrated on Holy Thursday, April 14, at 7 p.m. It is at this Mass that the commemoration of Christ's washing the feet of His Apostles occurs. Following the Mass, the Blessed Sacrament will be available for Eucharistic Adoration in St. Bernadette Oratory until midnight. Earlier in the day, at 8 a.m., there will be morning prayer in the Cathedral.

The Commemoration of the Lord's Passion will take place on Good Friday, April 15, at 3 p.m. The service begins with the Liturgy of the Word, followed by Veneration of the Cross with the faithful recognizing the "Cross of Christ" as their only hope of salvation. The celebration concludes with Holy Communion.

On Good Friday, in the Cathedral, there will be morning prayer at 8 a.m. followed by a Walk with Christ to the Old Catholic Cemetery and back, praying the Stations of the Cross, the Holy Rosary, and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy.

The Easter Vigil on Saturday, April 16, will begin at 8 p.m. in the Cathedral with the Service of Light outside the church.

Cathedral Mass times for Easter Sunday, April 17, are 7:30 a.m., 9:30 a.m., and 11:15 a.m., with

Mass in the Extraordinary Form at 4 p.m. Diocesan office hours for Holy Week are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Monday through Wednesday, April 11, 12, and 13. Offices will be closed on Holy Thursday and Good Friday, April 14 and 15, as

well as Easter Monday, April 18, reopening on Tuesday, April 19, at 8:30 a.m.
