LAKE CHARLES — "Dumb Ox," a team of homeschool students from the East Deanery, answered their way through a series of questions about the Catholic faith to claim the championship title in the 2023 Diocesan Quiz Bowl on Saturday, February 4.

The students chose their team's name in reference to Saint Thomas Aquinas who was dubbed the "Dumb Ox" by his classmates for his shyness. St. Thomas would prove to possess a rare brilliance, sparking a revolution in Christian thought.

Bishop Provost's Easter Message 2023

I am struck by the fact, as recorded in the Gospels, that the disciples of Jesus are surprised by the empty tomb (cf. John 20:9; Luke 24:4; Luke 24:21-24; Mark 16:3; Matthew 28:5ff.). The Lord had foretold His Passion, Death, and Resurrection, but as we know from the Gospel accounts, the disciples did not understand or fully



appreciate what was said (e.g. Luke 9:45). The tragedy of Calvary remained imprinted in their hearts and minds. Nonetheless, the tomb remains empty.

The world and its many tragedies are forcing us to encounter the cross. We are horrified by wars, violence, disease, and challenges that defy resolution or any remedy. Threats and disasters seem to be only minutes away—both originating from man and from nature. We could, like the disciples, be tempted to discouragement.

The liturgy of the Church strives to convey this sense of loss. On Good Friday in the ritual of the Catholic Church, the tabernacle is empty, no Mass is celebrated, and no decorations embellish our already simplified rituals. The Church's ancient rites summon the Book of Lamentations to reflect Her sentiments: "How lonely she is now, the once crowded city!" (Lamentations 1:1).

How the disciples must have sensed this desolation! Mary of Magdala cries out, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him" (John 20:2). However, soon after this desolation, a realization slowly overtakes that the sun has risen on a new day, seemingly like any other, but gloriously different. There are rumors (cf. Luke 24:22-23). There are apparitions (cf. Luke 24:4). And, as surely as the dissipating twilight at the break of day, a perception dawns that something completely new has happened, something we never thought possible, something to change our lives. The tomb is empty, and He has risen. Happy Easter!

St. Louis Choir invited to perform at national event

The St. Louis Catholic High School Concert Choir has been invited to perform in the National Memorial Day Choral Festival in Washington, D.C., May 26-29, 2023.

The musical tribute saluting America's military and fallen heroes is hosted by Music Celebrations International in partnership with the United States Air Force and the American Veterans Center.

Colette Tanner, SLCHS choir director, said choir members are excited about the opportunity, noting that St. Louis is the only high school from Southwest Louisiana chosen to participate. The application process took place in the spring of 2022.

"They were surprised when they learned about it but also excited," said Tanner. "I have never been to the ceremony, so I am just as excited as they are. When you are chosen to perform at festivals, it is always about the experience."

The St. Louis choir will have the distinguished honor of being featured in concert with the U.S. Air Force Symphony on Sunday, May 28, at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts along with choral groups from around the country.

Ahead of the Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 29, the choir will sing in front of the National Archives Building on Pennsylvania Avenue.

Tanner said the invitation to perform comes at a good time for the choral group made up of 24 students.

"I had already told the students that I wanted them to go somewhere. We are in a rebuilding phase for the choir," Tanner noted. "There was a time when the choir had 65-70 voices in it. I am trying to give them as many of the typical experiences that you would get in a choral program as possible."

In addition to state and district competitions, Broadway musicals, and three yearly concerts, the choir sings for three diocesan Masses throughout the year — Clergy and Religious Recognition Mass in September, Catholic Schools Week Diocesan Mass, and the Chrism Mass during Holy Week.

The Memorial Day Choral Festival will be a chance for them to bring their talent to the national level.

Other highlights will include performing at the Festival Wreath Laying Ceremony and Recital at the National World War II Memorial on Saturday, May 27, honoring veterans. The SLCHS singers will lay a custom-made wreath at the Louisiana column of the Memorial on behalf National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception where they have been invited to perform a halfhour concert of sacred music after Mass.

"The students want to sing *A Ukrainian Prayer* by composer John Rutter in response to the global tragedy in Ukraine," said Tanner. "The students love this song and had hoped we could remain in the Basilica after Mass for a few minutes to sing the prayer. Being invited to perform a concert is a gift for all of us."

While there are various patriotic events throughout the year, Tanner said she is especially grateful the St. Louis choir was chosen to sing for the national Memorial Day concert.

"Singing for Memorial Day gives a religious connotation that we can harken to because we are a Catholic school," she said. "We can delve into the fact that it is an act of mercy, burying the dead, honoring the dead. It speaks specifically to veterans who have passed, and we memorialize that. In a way, we are participating in a Corporal Work of Mercy."

Despite the obstacles thrown at them with back-to-back hurricanes in 2020 and other weather-related disasters that followed in 2021, the students have overcome many challenges.

"I think the St. Louis administration and the Diocese of Lake Charles have done a tremendous job with creating as positive an environment as they can with a temporary campus," Tanner said. "The students always rise above and sing so beautifully. I am so blessed to be able to work with them."

Tanner said the chance for the students to be with other high school choral students is priceless.

"I am glad they will have the opportunity to see they are just as good as choir members in areas that have not constantly had to overcome obstacles thrust on them by weather," she said.

Tanner added, "Singing in a choir becomes a humanistic experience in that we all work together to help each other on a communal plane that creates something beautiful beyond what we could do by ourselves."

National events like these are not without costs. Tanner said the trip for each student, including airfare, hotel accommodations, meals, and tickets to all events, will be \$2,000.

LAKE CHARLES – The Most Reverend Glen John Provost will complete the celebration of the final two services making up the Sacred Triduum - Good Friday and the Easter Vigil - in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, 935 Bilbo Street.

Earlier in Holy Week, the Bishop, along with the priests of the diocese, celebrated the Chrism Mass on Wednesday, April 5, where the Holy Oils – Oil of the Sick, Oil of Catechumens, and the Oil of Chrism – used during the year were prepared and blessed.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper, where the commemoration of Institution of the Eucharist and the Priesthood is celebrated, was Holy Thursday, April 6. Following the liturgy, Bishop Provost processed with the Blessed Sacrament followed by the congregation to the St. Bernadette Oratory for Eucharistic Adoration until midnight.

The Commemoration of the Lord's Passion will take place at 3p.m. today, April 7 – Good Friday – in the Cathedral. The service begins with the Liturgy of the Word, followed by Veneration of the Cross with the faithful recognizing the "Cross of Christ" as their only hope of salvation. The celebration concludes with Holy Communion.

On Good Friday, the Cathedral Parish will also participate in the Seven Church Walk that will begin at 8:00 a.m. from the Convent of Saint Martin de Porres, 1414 Martha Street. The walk, based on the Seven Last Words of Christ, will conclude at the Cathedral at approximately 1:00 p.m. Stations of the Cross will be prayed in the Cathedral at 2:00 p.m., followed by the Chaplet of Divine Mercy that will begin the Novena of Divine Mercy ending before the Commemoration of the Lord's Passion at 3:00 p.m.

The Novena of Divine Mercy will be prayed at the Cathedral at 3:00 p.m. on Holy Saturday (April 8) followed by offering of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation ending at 4:30 p.m.

The Easter Vigil on Saturday, April 8, will begin at 8:00 p.m., after sunset and the start of the new liturgical day, with what previously was called the "Service of Light" but now is known as The Solemn Beginning of the Vigil or Lucernarium." The solemn liturgy begins with the blessing of the fire and the preparation of the Paschal Candle.

Cathedral Mass times for Easter Sunday, April 9, are 7:30 a.m., 9:30 a.m., and 11:15 a.m., with Mass in accordance with the Rubrics of 1962 at 12:45 p.m. Bishop Provost is scheduled to celebrate the 9:30 a.m. Solemn Mass on Easter Sunday.

Diocesan offices continue to be closed today and on Easter Monday, April 10, reopening for regular office hours - 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. – on Tuesday, April 11, at 8:30 a.m.
