Decree for the Jubilee Year 2025

For an Everlasting Remembrance.

"Always be prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks the reason for the hope that is in you" (I Peter 3:15). Seventeen centuries ago, in June of 325, in the town of Nicaea not far from the then-capital of the Roman Empire, Constantinople, more than 200 Bishops met to fulfill these words of the Apostle Saint Peter by reaffirming the unchanging Catholic faith received from the Apostles concerning the true divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, the only Name in which mankind can hope for salvation (Acts 4:12). Upon this foundation we remain firm today.

As proclaimed in the Bull of Indiction, Spes non confundit, the Most Holy Father Francis, Bishop of Rome and Servant of the servants of God, solemnly declared the opening of the ordinary Jubilee Holy Year of 2025 in Rome, calling all Christians to be "pilgrims of hope." His Holiness points us toward the pierced Heart of Jesus Christ as the one "through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand" (Rom. 1:2). He is the "sure and steadfast anchor of the soul" (Heb. 6:19).

THEREFORE, following the decree of Pope Francis, as the Bishop of the Diocese of Lake Charles, We hereby proclaim the Holy Year of 2025 for this local Church of Lake Charles, to be solemnly inaugurated in Our Cathedral on Sunday, December 29th of this year, and to continue until its conclusion on Sunday, December 28th, 2025. In order to cooperate most fully with this initiative and to favor the reception of manifold graces, We also hereby decree

THAT the following shall be designated as pilgrimage churches in the Diocese of Lake Charles for the Holy Year of 2025 (cf. Decree of the Sacred Tribunal of the Apostolic Penitentiary, May 13, 2024):

- [1] The Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, in which stands the image of the Blessed Virgin Mary crowned by the authority of His Holiness Benedict PP. XVI. (one of only four in the nation and of only two in the state to be so honored);
- [2] The parish church of Sacred Heart of Jesus in Lake Charles, well-known for its connection to Saint Katharine Drexel, whose love for the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the



Blessed Sacrament and whose courage and initiative in addressing social inequality among minorities have been a lasting legacy;

- [3] The parish church of Our Lady of Prompt Succor in Sulphur;
- [4] The parish church of Our Lady Help of Christians in Jennings; and

THAT the following shall be designated as pilgrimage holy sites in the Diocese of Lake Charles for the Holy Year of 2025 (ibid.):

- [1] The diocesan Shrine of Our Lady Star of the Sea in
- [2] The parochial Shrine of Our Lady of LaSalette in Sulphur; and

THAT, in addition to the indulgences already contained in the Enchiridion Indulgentiarum, IV. ed., which remain in force, We remind the faithful of those already granted by Us concerning the recitation of the Divine Office and the Prayer for the Family (Decrees of June 7th, 2014), as well as those already granted concerning the diocesan Shrine of Our Lady Star of the Sea (Decree of March 25th, 2020), and We exhort the faithful to take advantage of those special plenary indulgences granted by the Holy

Father for this Holy Year of 2025 and obtainable each day of the Holy Year.

THAT, in order to facilitate access to the Sacrament of Penance and the obtaining of divine forgiveness through the "Power of the Keys," all priests who are incardinated into this Diocese or who have been approved for ministry in this Diocese, and whose faculties have not been revoked, are granted for the period of this Holy Year the same authority to absolve from censures that We have granted to Our diocesan Penitentiary, or granted by universal law (canons 508 §1, 1355 §2), whenever they are administering the Sacrament in any of the aforesaid pilgrimage churches or at the aforesaid holy sites (cf. Decree of the Sacred Tribunal of the Apostolic Penitentiary, May 13, 2024).

THAT the Instruction which We have caused to be appended to this Decree, which contains Our other dispositions with regard to the initiatives and opportunities through which this Jubilee of hope will benefit the Christian faithful of Our Diocese, shall be faithfully and generously implemented by the Parish Priests and those others whom it concerns.

With unbounded confidence in her intercession for the fruitfulness of this coming Year of Grace, we entrust these things to that incomparable Woman of Hope, the Most Blessed Virgin, Star of the Sea.

All things to the contrary not withstanding.

Guidance for visiting holy sites, gaining Plenary Indulgences

Instruction Regarding the Initiatives and Opportunities to Benefit the Christian Faithful in the **Diocese of Lake Charles** For the Jubilee Year 2025

December 1, 2024

In the Ordinary Jubilee of 2025, called by His Holiness Pope Francis, the faithful are invited to become Pilgrims of Hope and to turn to the generosity of God's Mercy. The Supreme Pontiff has opened the treasury of God's Mercy, providing various opportunities to obtain a Plenary Indulgence. Many of these opportunities are detailed in the document Decree on the Granting of the Indulgence During the Ordinary Jubilee Year 2025 Called by His Holiness Pope Francis released by the Apostolic Penitentiary.

In addition to those established by the Apostolic Penitentiary, local Ordinaries are encouraged to consider the needs of the faithful in their dioceses. They should designate Churches or other sacred places for pilgrims to visit to receive indulgences. This document outlines how the faithful in the Diocese of Lake Charles can obtain indulgences locally. As a reminder, in this Jubilee year, all other indulgences universally and locally previously granted remain in effect.

To receive a Plenary Indulgence for each indulgence, the faithful must fulfill the usual conditions: They should be motivated by a spirit of charity, purified through the sacrament of penance (within 20 days), refreshed by Holy Communion, and pray for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff (a Hail Mary, an Our Father, and a Glory Be is sufficient). As with all indulgences, the faithful must be "truly repentant and free from all affection for sin" (cf. Enchiridion Indulgentiarum, IV ed., norm. 20, 1). If these conditions are met and the faithful complete a pilgrimage, pious visit, or a charitable act, they will receive a Plenary Indulgence. The list of churches and holy sites are listed below as well as how to complete a pilgrimage, pious visit, and

Unique to this Jubilee Year, "the faithful

who perform an act of charity on behalf of the souls in Purgatory can obtain the Plenary Indulgence twice on the same day-applicable only to the deceased-if they receive Holy Communion a second time that day."1

Pilgrimages


For the Jubilee year, a pilgrimage is a planned journey that should be led by a priest or deacon who offers Holy Mass, a Liturgy of the Word, the Liturgy of the Hours (Office of Readings, Lauds, Vespers), the Via Crucis (the Way of the Cross), the Marian Rosary, the recitation of the Akathist hymn, or a penance service as established in the Rite of Penance (form II). Priests and deacons are encouraged to lead the faithful on a pilgrimage to designated Pilgrimage Churches and Holy Sites. However, they should make preparations and plans with those locations before their arrival.

Pious Visits

Even if the faithful do not have the opportunity to participate under the direction of a priest or deacon for a pilgrimage, they may make a pious visit to these locations individually or in a group. A pious visit involves spending a suitable amount of time in Eucharistic adoration and meditation, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith in any legitimate form, and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God.

Charitable Acts

Spes non confundit calls the faithful to be "tangible signs of hope," by performing, with a devout spirit for an appropriate amount of time, works of charity. These



works of charity include visiting the sick, imprisoned, lonely elderly, and the disabled. While all these opportunities are suitable to receive the indulgence, the faithful in the diocese are encouraged to offer an act of charity by volunteering at Catholic Charities. Catholic Charities

provides many food distributions across the diocese, and the Jubilee Year is a great time to serve those in need.

Bishop Provost's Christmas Message 2024

As we conclude Advent and begin our celebration of the birthday of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, I am reminded of a statement by George Bernanos, a noted French author. He wrote, "The Church has need not of reformers but of saints." Christmas reminds me of the wisdom of those words. After all, does not our Lord make clear in the Sermon on the Mount that we are called to perfection (cf. Matthew 5:48). Here, at Christmas, the Eternal Word of God takes flesh in the womb of the Virgin Mary and is born into the world to teach us, by word and example, how we are to live better lives. We are reminded as well that this vocation, this call, is to be saints. Jesus Christ calls us to perfection, not mediocrity. I think this is a major part of the "good news."

At Christmas the Gospel speaks of the "good news of great joy" proclaimed first to the shepherds. What is this good news that moves the shepherds to go in haste to Bethlehem? It is not the promise of material possessions. Nor is it a summons to embrace a cause. These are things that would attract a "reformer," to use the reference of Bernanos. A "reformer" needs a cause and often seeks a radical societal change. These changes might be praiseworthy, although often reformers bring about changes that even they live to regret. But the "good news of great joy"—what is it?

The shepherds find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes, surrounded by animals in a manger, with a joyful mother looking on, and a thoughtful Joseph standing watch. The angel had made the following proclamation to them:

"For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord" (Luke 2:11). The "good news" is that a "savior" is born, who is both "Messiah and Lord." Implied in this proclamation is the profound message of salvation, redemption from sin, reconciliation with God, future hope, and peace on earth.

Each time I look at a manger scene or Christmas Creche, I am reminded of the call from God to do better, to live a good life, to reject sin, to move closer in relationship with Him. When I reflect on the Nativity in Bethlehem, I want to hear that "good news" proclaimed to me once again, the "good news of great joy" heard by the shepherds, about a "Messiah and Lord" who was born not in a palace but in a manger. Here is a "Messiah and Lord" who was first and foremost obedient to the Father's Will. That obedience can bring about a change in my own life.

There are many lessons to be learned from Christmas. One of the greatest is that "all things are possible for God," even His birth to a Virgin Mother in a manger of Bethlehem. What wondrous accomplishments came forth from the humble beginnings in Bethlehem. What marvels await us who follow His example of humility and submission to the Father's Will, the striving for holiness, the pursuit of a saintly life. There is always a greater good. We can always strive to
